Pastor's Letter

New Things

Forget the former things;
do not dwell on the past.

See, I am doing a new thing!
Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?

I am making a way in the wilderness
and streams in the wasteland.

~ Isaiah 43:18-19

Most of us have heard this passage from the Book of Isaiah. It's a wonderful thought: that God is doing new things. New things sound nice. Wouldn't most of us like something new? And that is particularly the case if those new things God is doing are making a way for us out of the wilderness. I know I have some wilderness in my life that I'd like a way out of! All in all, it sounds nice....as long as I have time for it.

This time of year can feel very scripted. It's summer wrap up and getting ready for fall time. After the laid-back attitude of June and July, August is the last chance for trips, school shopping, and plans. Here in the church office it is also a time of wrap up. It's a time to look at Sunday School programs, worship series for the Fall, Advent and Christmas plans, and a host of other items. It's remarkably busy. Too busy. So busy that I don't always stop to see those new things that God is doing. In fact, sometimes it feels like nothing new is happening because I've seen this all before.

This morning that truth struck me. God has been doing new things all around me. I would like to share some of the new things that I've seen in the past few weeks:

I was able to hold new William (Hursey) Culbertson not even a day after he was born and to have him look up at me (likely wondering who this weird guy was) and then a week later being in intensive care with little Brennan (Montgomery) Leugers praying over his little warming bed for health and healing. Both young men are doing God's new thing.

I watched as the finishing touches were made to the basement project: brand new carpet, linoleum in the kitchen, the walls repainted, and new lights everywhere. It looks amazing due to the giving and participation of many individuals. It makes me think what this building is even doing God's new thing.

I was able to talk with Kory Enneking about going off to college for the first time; about the classes he's going to take and new life experiences he will find. And a week before, I was able to talk to Amanda Rhonemus about her first teaching job and her first apartment with all the excitement that goes into both. Both of these young people are doing God's new thing.

I see the newness that went into organizing, cataloging, and even trying new choral pieces. Knowing that it only came together because of many hands and open hearts. I see the newness committee's work over the past months to not just rest upon what we have done, but to ask what can we do. In these areas and more, I see God's new thing.

I think about our members who are sharing their first sermon, experiencing a change in health, those in their first year in a start-up business, those who are resigning from roles, those having a change in living conditions, and so many more stories. And I see, that we are doing God's new thing.

All of these sisters and brothers, as well as so many more, are heeding the call of God to a new thing: to re-creation, to renewal, to life. So, whenever I feel tempted to feel that things are not going forward to God's purpose, I see that I need to quiet my life to see clearly. Once I do, I can look around, and the new ways are all around me. Take a few minutes now (or when you can) to stop and think: "where am I seeing God's new things in my life?" Write them down. And then praise God in prayer, song, or art that in His love, God is always doing a new thing to lead us out of the wilderness.

What is a Bible Commentary?

(And why would I ever look at one?)

The Interpretation series is an invaluable resource for any interested in interpreting the biblical text to the broader church. Its works are essential for pastors, educators, and church libraries. ~ Brian K. Blount, President and Professor of New Testament at Union Presbyterian Theological Seminary

I doubt that it will surprise anyone to know that I get excited over books. A quick glance in my office, and you'll see books on shelves, on window sills, and piled on my desk. Sometimes I think I have more books than I have anything else! So, it's likely little cause for fanfare when there is a new book in the church. Yet, I'd like to encourage you to look at a new book for you: a recently acquired for the church Bible Commentary Series called *Interpretation*.

"Bible Commentary? Ok, what's that?," you might ask.

A Bible Commentary is a book, or in this case a series of books, where scholars and teachers work through the Bible and give insight, or *commentary* on a passage. This insight comes in a variety of forms: it can be historical knowledge about the area, details about the people, ways that the language has changed, ideas for modern application, and even stories or teaching points. It is a go-to resource for a deeper understanding on any book or passage in the Bible. And, the Interpretation series we have is one of the best reviewed modern commentaries, from a Reformed publishing house too! The Interpretation series is written by a collection of authors, all of whom are well respected and reviewed in their area of specialty.

Certainly as one who prepares sermons, teaching lessons, and other items for the church, I have used commentaries for years. But this is not a resource for me, but for you. Say that you're leading a Small Group discussion on the Psalms of David. What do you know about the Psalms? How can you figure out which Psalms were written when? How would you help others hear a Psalm in a new way? The same can be said for

something you heard in Sunday School, preparing for a youth group lesson, or otherwise trying to understand the Bible in greater depth. And, unlike online searching, you are going to find a good answer the first time you search (rather than wasting hours in Google) and you know that the authors are trusted and peer-reviewed professionals, rather than just some random a web page.

I encourage you that next time you're preparing to lead a group or want to find out more about the Bible, to take one from the shelf and give it a try. I guarantee that you will learn something new. And, as always, let me know if I can ever be a help in your studies. ~ Pastor Matthew

Sunday School Start Up and Kick Off!

On September 8, we will be starting up our Sunday School Class year. At 9:00 AM everyone will be meeting in the sanctuary for an orientation and kick off celebration (food!) for the Sunday School year before splitting out to our different classes (primary Adult Class, optional). This year we are trying a very different curriculum for our children, youth, and one of our adult classes – a combined curriculum using *The Story* from Zondervan Publishing.

The Story is a novel (and novel) approach to Sunday School in that it is the Bible, but arranged more like a novel than we are normally used to it. Now, it is an abridged Bible, but that allows students and classes to focus on the Bible as a single book as compared to breaking it down into smaller pieces. The really interesting aspect of this class is that elementary, middle, and high school, and the alternative adult class will all be studying the same passage, the same week (but each in their own, age appropriate way). This way, parents (and grandparents) can share and relate directly to what children are studying. If you have a multi-generational family in the church, I encourage you to join us, even if you've not been in Sunday school for a while. Even if someone does not have children in the church right now, by studying the same Bible stories, it will equip adults to share and relate to those of other generations. Food Pantry Meal Sunday

Reminder: Our church continues to support the Bluffton Community Assistance Program. With the reorganization of the food pantry, our congregation is encouraged to continue to emphasize the 3Cs: cereal, crackers, and cookies. There is also a current need for canned fruit. If you would like to continue to support this mission, please bring donations the second Sunday of each month.

Our church has also been placed on the program coordinator's list – so stay tuned for opportunities to help organize donations during local events promoting our local food pantry.

3 Cents a Meal Offering

The first Sunday of each month the little church is placed on the floor in the front for the 3 cents a meal offering.

During the month you place 3 cents for each meal, which is 9 cents a day or about \$2.70 a month per person into a container and bring that money on the first Sunday and place it in the church during the offering.

This money is donated to the Bluffton Community Assistance Program. Thanks for your help.

 which allows multiple authorized users to view
 the financial records on a secure basis.
 Approved that any non-payroll check to a
 relative of Treasurer is required to have two
 signatures.

- Approved hiring Michelle Zuehlke as
 Treasurer effective September 1, 2013 –
 December 31, 2013 at current Treasurer's salary rate. Performance will be reviewed by year's end. Training will be provided by Cathy Carroll during August. Michelle will be compensated for training which could be approximately \$371 depending on when training is initiated.
- Approved transferring \$310 from these line items for 2013 budget under Ministerial Services - Continuing Education to Travel and Professional Expenses (in contract ending August 31, 2013). Pastor Matthew has incurred more mileage than expected and was able to secure additional funding sources for continuing education which was previously approved for August.




