"It ain't what it used to be"

(to the tune "the ol' grey mare")

Summer! It isn't what it used to be.

Do you remember summer? Hot summer nights with the windows open and the fan running. You could hear Woodward Avenue (4 lanes each way) at half mile away, even in the middle of the night. And summer drifted, with engineering projects (setting up the train table in the garage) and afternoon bike rides out to Cranbrook (12 miles). Ah summer! Gentle but focused. Until (prum, ta duhm duhm, (the menacing Dragnet theme) Labor Day. Labor Day was the end of summer. So much so that I still feel a little ill at the thought of it. I loved school, but losing the freedom of summer was enough to bring on *physical* dread. Labor Day and **then** you headed back to school. Right?

With an urgency born of this hope, the church applies itself to present tasks and strives for a better world. It does not identify limited progress with the kingdom of God on earth, nor does it despair in the face of disappointment and defeat. In steadfast hope, the church looks beyond all partial achievement to the final triumph of God.

Weekday Christian Education Annual Report

The annual meeting of the WCE-RT Board was held in late June. This voluntary, Christian Education program has been running in the Bluffton schools for 92 years! A large number of elementary students meet at First Mennonite Church; 677 student participants, 90% of children in grades 1-5. Middle School groups meet every other week in the Youth for Christ building. Bibles were distributed to 50 2nd graders. The school has asked that the program be expanded to kindergarten during the second half of the year.

The WCE program is funded by donations and student fees. Some churches pay the fees for their children, our church budget does not do that. Scholarships cover the fees for children who cannot pay. Donations are welcome for scholarships or to cover supplies.



Bluffton Relay for Life/Hope was a great success and it was great to have Presbyterians join us. We were able to give American Cancer Society a check for \$26,000, that is \$5,000 more than last year and we are already brainstorming for next year.

We Went and Now We are Ready to Go!

Sarah Gillen, Megan Sycks, Patrick and Tenna Rhonemus attended the 2016 Presbyterian Youth Triennium and it was awesome! From July 19-23 we worshiped, explored our faith, played games, developed new friendships, and renewed old ones. We did this with 4700 other Presbyterian youth from all over the country and across the world. For 5 very hot days, Purdue University became one of the most energized, loving, accepting, and faith filled places on earth!

This year's theme was "Go", a very small and incredibly powerful word. Each day we explored a different aspect of our call to "Go". We met in small groups, comprised of people we have never met, to explore the Bible lesson of the day and build new friendships. We met as Presbytery Delegations for more Bible exploration and connecting to those nearer to home. The recreation events offered opportunities to express what we had learned in creative, active ways and through service projects. One project involved taking old jeans and making shoes for those who have need. The youth made over 300 pairs of shoes without ever sewing a stitch!

The favorite part of Triennium for our youth was the worship services. Yep, you read that right! They described them as engaging and fun! The "energizers", short choreographed routines to popular songs, that began before worship got everyone up and moving together. Some were clumsy (Tenna) and some were skilled (the youth) but we were all dancing together and anticipation was building for the message we would receive that day. Each service was 2 or more hours long and we left with new insight and feeling refueled. In part our energy level was boosted by the blessing of an air conditioned building, but mainly because of the very powerful and motivational messages we received from the pastors who spoke each day.

We learned God is F.U.N. (Forgiving, Understanding, and Never- Too- Busy)!

We learned that negative perceptions, attitudes, and self-doubts "gotta go", so we can fully experience God and live out God's plan for our lives.

From Rev. Dr. Perryn Rice in our final worship service we learned, "G-O means get out. The Lord wants us to get out and see, do, and apply what we have learned. Get out and be set free. Get out into the world. That's what the Lord wants for each and every one of us."


You have heard me say this before, but I feel it deserves repeating. We have incredible youth in this congregation! One of the highlights for me came at the worship service when we were to collect the offering. The offering collected at Triennium will help transform shipping containers headed for landfills into a storm-resistant classroom for students at the National Heroes Institute in Leyte, part of the United Church of Christ in the Philippines.

The classroom, designed by Silliman University engineers, may even help save lives because it will be used as a shelter during natural disasters. At the beginning of worship offering baskets were carried to the front of the worship hall. Our youth were genuinely concerned they had missed the opportunity to place their offering in the baskets and wanted to make sure they could make their contribution to the project. Later in the worship when the baskets were circulated to collect the offering their concern turned to astonishment. There were so many donations being made runners had to take the full baskets to be emptied so they could continue to collect the offering! The outpouring of generosity in this one worship service was incredible and it did not stop there.

Our youth's commitment to generously care for others carried over to every interaction and every moment of the event. Our youth demonstrated compassion, concern, and a deep appreciation for everyone whom they met! They made new friends within our delegation, and throughout the country. When others were in need, they stepped up to help. They guided others across campus, willingly took up any task asked of them, and became a support for injured and ill delegation members. They looked out for each other and everyone within the delegation. They had fun! Their goofy antics, contagious laughter and easy going spirit made everyone comfortable and drew others to them! They made the most of this opportunity! I have no doubt that the lessons learned and the questions explored through the 2016 Triennium will continue to shape their lives and the lives of those around them for many years to come.

I encourage everyone to talk to our youth about their experience! I am certain they have some great stories to share!
