Pastor's Letter

Like it or not, this will not be a normal holiday season. As we enter prepare for Advent and Christmas, perhaps we had hoped that the familiar rituals of this special season would be unaffected by the pandemic that has overwhelmed most of the calendar year. And yet, it seems that the pandemic will be interfering with our Thanksgiving and Christmas gatherings, no less than it did our Easter celebrations, graduations, and summer vacation plans. Though, we admit, our plans are a small price to pay compared to those whose health and lives are on the line against the deadly virus.

With so many activities cancelled, altered, or postponed until next year, we may be tempted to adopt a passive attitude about our role in the world. But we are not nobodies – we are followers of Jesus, the one whose arrival this season announces. We have important roles to fulfill, especially in a world full of suffering.

Donna Frischknecht Jackson, editor of Presbyterians Today, remembers a powerful embodied experience leading her to consider what "role" she might play this Christmas. She writes: "I often find myself staring long and hard at the nativity scene, trying to imagine all of the holy sights and sounds. As I stare, I wonder, "What is my role in this pageant of grace?"

In years past, I have never had the time to really answer that question. There were always things to distract me – gifts to wrap, cookies to make, worship services to plan, church dinners, and decorating parties. I believe this year, though, we are being given a chance to reassess and define our roles. I believe we are being given an opportunity to step into the narrative in a powerful, albeit uncomfortable and not exactly what we might have wanted, new way.

With many congregations forgoing in-person Christmas Eve worship services due to COVID-19 precautions, we will be faced with emotions not [typically] associated with the celebration of this holy night. We will perhaps feel the fear of uncertainty and a disorienting sense of displacement. But wasn't there uncertainty and displacement that very first Christmas? If you think you are disappointed that you won't be able to sit in your church pew, imagine how Mary must have felt giving birth away from home and in a stable. Yet God was there – and is still here with us.

What if our COVID-19-tinged Christmas is actually a moment to make the story of salvation real? What if the most beautiful Christmas hymn is not performed by a choir, but sung in your off-key voice over Zoom or the phone to a lonely friend? What if the light that shines in the dark comes from our hearts, rather than from those little candles we hold while singing "Silent Night"? What if this year, by finding ourselves in a place we have never been before, scattered from one another without the traditions we cherish, we discover that we have an opportunity to participate in salvation's scenes beyond a sanctuary?

My prayer for us all is this Christmas we find ourselves standing in awe as we squeal with the realization, I'm in the Christmas story!" (Presbyterians Today Nov/Dec 2020 pg. 4).

May we all use our quieter celebration this Advent and Christmas to reflect on the unique role God is calling us to fulfill in the great story of faith. Now is the time to say yes to God's call, to love God and to love neighbor. Love – the most important action of all, and the one God shows us in the birth of Jesus.

Advent

The season of Advent begins on the fourth Sunday before Christmas. Advent means "coming" or "arrival." Advent anticipates not only the birth of Jesus, but also the coming of Christ at the end of time, to fulfill God's intention for creation and to bring a new heaven and a new earth into being. When the celebration of Advent first began, the focus was on the coming of Christ into the future more than on the birth of Jesus. Early liturgical calendars placed Advent at the end of the church year rather than at the beginning for this very reason. During Advent, we read from the prophet Isaiah, who told of the Savior who would bring hope to God's people in a time of oppression. We recall the role of John the Baptist, calling for people to repent of their sins in preparation for the coming of the Messiah. We are reminded of God's steadfast love for us in a world that is unsettled and ever changing. We reaffirm that God is engaged in the workings of creation, for God is with us – Emmanuel. The church faces the ongoing challenge of celebrating Advent as its own season and not rushing too quickly into Christmas. The time of repentance and preparation is necessary before we welcome the Savior into our lives and into the world.

Star Word

Here is a star word reflection from Tenna Rhonemus:



I was home sick the Sunday the star words were passed out. Mike grabbed one for me-healing. I laughed when I read it, but he promised he had randomly selected it.

I was feeling better the next day, and being a "checklist" person, I remembered my word and thought "one and done". But my word wasn't healed, it was healing. That difference in suffix is important. Healing is not something we can simply mark off our "to do" list, it is an ongoing process. I was determined to make healing an ongoing focus. But where was I to begin... a quote from Linda Hogan gave me a good starting point.

"Some people see scars, and it is wounding they remember. To me they are proof of the fact that there is healing."

Boy has this been a year of wounding! I have experienced and witnessed wounds on every level-globally down to personally. I imagine we all have our own exhaustive list of wounds. But my focus was on *healing*. So I began looking for scars in the hopes of finding proof of healing.

Typically we avoid looking for scars. They make us uncomfortable, we avert our eyes and avoid discussing them. Those who bear them may try to hide or disguise them. If they are our own, they may hold painful memories we want to forget. But if we view them "as proof of the fact that there is healing" everything changes. Scars become a symbol of progress toward physical, emotional and/or mental wellbeing. They become a testament to strength and endurance. The act of seeing and ultimately embracing scars, whether our own or those of others, is an act of love. And isn't love at the root of everything that is good, including healing?

I am working to embrace scars as a means of finding and hopefully offering healing.
Admittedly, I am not good at this, but just as healing is a process, so is the embracing of scars. I am committed to this process because I am committed to sharing love.

My focus on scars, as proof of healing and ultimately love, also led me to a renewed perspective of my faith. I have been given the ultimate proof of healing. Out of love, Christ endured and overcame the wound of sin on my behalf. I can look upon the scars that Jesus bears and know that there is healing. It seems weird to write about this as we are approaching Advent and looking forward to the arrival of Jesus as a baby. Many may think this is more appropriate for Lent. But may these words from Psalms remind us why Jesus came, and may we give thanks for healing, scars and most importantly love.

Psalm 107:20-21

"He sent out his word and healed them; he rescued them from the grave. Let them give thanks to the Lord for his unfailing love and his wonderful deeds for humankind."

- October Pastoral Care: 5 visits; 26 calls; 18 cards sent.

Community Engagement: BAMA Election Day prayer series and BAMA ecumenical Thanksgiving service on Facebook. Presbytery: Rekindle Youth Retreat Planning Zoom, New Pastors' Group Gathering, Installation Commission and Zoom Service for Rev. Lanie Sipes (Toledo Christ Presbyterian Church), Discipleship Commission, and MVP General Presbyter/pastoral leaders check in. Appointed to serve as moderator for the Ottawa PC Session after their pastor leaves on November 22. Nominated to chair the Discipleship Commission for 2021. Continuing Education: October 23–29 completed Clergy Clinic in Family Emotional Process first of three. Approved Continuing Education request for 2021 February 8-15 to attend Clergy Clinic in Family Emotional

Service to the Greater Church: November 9-12 for Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary Alum Board Meeting/Reunion (elected Secretary of Alum Board), MVP Rekindle Youth Retreat (November 13 -15) cancelled.

Process second of three.

Proposed Dates for New Officers:
Congregational Meeting to elect officers and approve Pastors' Terms of Call – December 6, Training for Incoming Officers – TBD,
Session Meeting to examine new officers for Installation/Ordination – December 10, and Installation/Ordination of new officers during worship – January 10.

Approval given to Marilyn Edwards to borrow church's wheelchair. Dorothy Hursey died November 8 – no service at this time.

- Fellowship bonfire held at Don and Cathy Carroll's on October 31. Deacons' BBQ dinner profit \$329. Served 63 meals at the Community Meal. Meal following Tyler From's Celebration of Life went well.
- Toilet in men's restroom probably needs replaced. First Klass Lawncare will be fertilizing the manse yard.
- Adult Faith Formation class trying a Zoom format for their "Unravelled" discussions.
 "Growing in God's Love" lessons and youth Bibles distributed to the families with children. Youth Group has been meeting via Zoom for Bible studies with some activities tentatively scheduled in person. Claralice Circle continues to meet in person. Have not received any updates regarding Release Time Weekday Christian Education plans for the new year.
- Adopt-a-family plan to adopt 1-2 families with wish list to be sent electronically to church family. Blanket tying materials ready for congregation – designated \$100 from local mission money to purchase kits. Lima Rescue Mission – \$100 from Local Mission to support the December pizza meal. Collected \$316 for Peace & Global Witness Offering. Sponsored 30 children (\$3 per child) for Bluffton Annual Child Safety Education Program – normally supported National Night Out, but was cancelled this year. Little Free Food Pantry continues to get support from Dollar General and local donations. Christmas Joy offering will be collected through December. Lynda Best coordinated food for set up volunteers for Blaze of Lights on November 6. There will not be a public lighting event, so will not be serving annual dinner.
- Nominating Committee has secured nominations for almost all officer positions for next year. Staff evaluations completed.
 Personnel Committee met via Zoom for Pastor's evaluation. Betsey Angus connected with other employees.

- Reviewed draft 2021 operating budget for initial discussion, with goal of incorporating elders' recommendations to obtain Session approval of budget at December's Session meeting. Approved to continue paying Nursery staff and Choir Director at present reduced amounts into 2021 until their positions would return to regular responsibilities. Proposed budget includes increases for staff – amount recommended by Personnel. Pastor Karol excused herself so elders could discuss pastor salary increase to propose to congregation. Approved to recommend increase with line items to be worked out between Clair/Pastor Karol. Discussion of Roll On fund – Pastor Karol talked with Laura From to discern financial situation. Church will pay full amount on van loan payment until it is sold then assist with outstanding medical and death bills. Plan to stop collecting money for this account at end of 2020. Laura will receive any remaining money after loan payments, bills covered. Approved Personnel's request to give all staff \$150 Christmas gift this year in recognition of extra work required of staff during pandemic.
- Continuing to follow state's color-coding level system for determining status of worship gatherings, presently Level 3 (red), with online service only, with readers, etc. in attendance. Minor adjustments had been made to in-person worship prior to county going to Level 3. Working on sound quality of live stream services. Plan to bring in a professional sound tech to make equipment adjustments, standardize procedures. Expecting Christmas Eve Service to be recorded and shared electronically. Pulpit Supply: November 15 George Stultz and December 27 Tenna Rhonemus.
- Approved calling Congregational Meeting via Zoom for Sunday, December 6 following livestream service for the purposes of electing Elders, Deacons, Nominating Committee for 2021 and approving Pastor's Terms of Call for 2021.

• Bob and Tammie Hursh, along with support of others, will continue monthly Pizza Night for Lima Rescue Mission for 2021. Approved the job description for Communications Coordination position and salary range for 2021. Approved Digital Communication Policy (for outside organizations wanting to have messages on new sign).

Up to \$300 Tax Deduction Available for 2020 Tax Returns

(Certain phrases copied from CAPINCROUSE)
The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic
Security Act (the CARES Act) enacted in March
2020 includes an incentive for charitable
donations (such as your gifts to Bluffton
Presbyterian Church!). For 2020 only, taxpayers
who do not itemize their deductions may claim a
charitable contribution deduction up to \$300 for
the taxable year for contributions of money made
to a qualified charitable/religious organization.
This one-year provision does not permit an abovethe-line deduction for unused charitable
contributions carried forward from a prior year.

The CARES Act does not explicitly address whether couples filing a joint return may claim \$300 each. This information may not become available until the instructions for 2020 form 1040 are published. The Stewardship & Finance Committee will let you know if we become aware of any updates on this question.

Update on Roll-On Fund

On behalf of Laura From and the Bluffton Presbyterian Church Session, thank you for your generous support of the Roll-On Transportation fund, which provided 50% of the monthly payment obligation to Tyler and Laura From for their special-needs van. Your assistance ensured that Tyler and Laura had a reliable means of transportation.

Due to Tyler's passing on October 9, Bluffton Presbyterian Church will discontinue collecting funds for the Roll-On fund at the end of this year. Session has approved the utilization of Roll-On funds to assist Laura's ongoing needs to fund the van loan until the van is sold, with the remainder utilized to assist with Laura's financial expenses. On October 31, Roll-On funds totaled \$6,439.

Mission News

Building Resilience Together

Letter excerpt from Jhan Dotel-Vellenga and Ian Vellenga, mission co-workers serving in Nicaragua.

Several weeks ago, we took part in a workshop about building resilience. It was put together by the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance program for all of those interested in learning a little more about the topic and perhaps sharing it with others.

Resilience is the ability to bounce back from challenging times in life. Resilience comes from the lessons and skills we learn as we grow up and as we face difficulties. It's a person's natural ability to cope, deal with, and adapt to hardship and adversity when they are faced with calamity, natural disasters, health concerns, relationship troubles, divorces, tragedies, school challenges, job losses, or the death of a loved one.

Many countries, mainly developed ones, have created and invested in social protection programs to help individuals and families, especially the poor and vulnerable ones, to cope with natural disasters and different types of crises.


This makes me think about the people and communities we work with in Nicaragua. Communities that are underprivileged and not well served, where most of the people face multiple challenges daily, such as meeting basic daily needs for themselves and their families. Their challenges go way beyond the random natural disaster or unpredictable global pandemic. Many of them are part of communities where basic education, healthcare, and potable water are still lacking, and the means to provide them is a big challenge. Their strength and capacity to endure often come from a place of optimism and hope. They show incredible resilience and creativity in the face of deprivation and poverty.



An important component of CEPAD's work is to support and assist people living in rural communities by implementing programs that aim to help them better support themselves and their families through community training, leadership, sustainable agriculture, economic development, and much more. Part of what we can do as partners of communities like these is add to that resilience by providing a listening ear and, when possible, a helping hand. The people in these communities are already good at surviving, but as partners we can help them to thrive and flourish. We might not be able to help them to meet all their needs or even resolve many of the problems they face, but with our support we can help to strengthen their ability to withstand, adapt to, and recover from adversity.

We thank you for your support to our work and mission, and for keeping the people of Nicaragua and CEPAD in your thoughts. We pray for your safety and well-being during these troubled times and hope you are surrounded by love and abiding grace.

Global Peace & Witness Offering

Thank you for your support of this PCUSA special offering. Bluffton University's Lion & Lamb Peace Arts Center received \$80 and \$236 went to the denomination to support global peace and justice work.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (PDA) is responding to the urgent needs in Central America following Hurricanes Eta and Iota. PDA started processing preliminary emergency assistance soon after Eta to our long-term partners in Guatemala, Nicaragua and Honduras, but with the additional impact of Category 4 Iota making landfall on the coast of Nicaragua, the needs are even greater. The double impact of these storms has resulted in over 100 lives lost and significant damage from flooding and mudslides; mass evacuations are further complicated by COVID-19. Priorities for the response include WASH (water, sanitation and hygiene), food security, shelter, and livelihood restoration.

Check out this year's online (printable) Advent & Christmas devotional from *Presbyterians Today*. Howard Thurman's classic poem – "I Will Light Candles This Christmas" – says that the light that burns brightly is the light of Christ shining through us. It's a light that dashes away sadness with joy, replaces fear with courage, and banishes despair with hope. This year has indeed been one in need of light. It's been a year of pandemic, coupled with racial and political unrest. It's been an unprecedented year that has pushed us into speaking boldly and truthfully. It has dared us to step away from the comfort of doing things in the old familiar way and to try something new in our ministries.

Our Advent and Christmas devotional for 2020 is no exception. This year's devotional is online only and is available for free at pcusa.org/2020advent. You can also download or print a PDF of each week's section.

The theme is based on lighting those candles featured in Thurman's poem – challenging us to shine not only through the four weeks of Advent, but also through the 12 days of Christmas and ending with the celebration of Epiphany. Each week starts with a stanza from Thurman's poem and reflection questions. Subsequent days feature a Scripture verse, reflection, closing prayer and an option to go deeper with suggestions for other activities.
