## **Pastor's Letter**



### Pastor's Letter: A Review of Presbyterian 101

Over the course of 3 Sunday afternoons, a handful of curious minds joined me to explore who we are as Presbyterians. Of the 5 attendees, only one was raised in the Presbyterian Church. Though others had spent years in the denomination, everyone had something to learn. We barely scratched the surface, but hopefully answered a few basic questions, and sparked interest for further learning opportunities on more particular topics. The bulk of our material came from the book *Presbyterian Questions, Presbyterian Answers* which has succinct yet helpful answers to a wide variety of questions one might have about our denomination.

The following list offers a glimpse into the topics that were addressed during the three sessions:

- Unpacking the symbols in the PCUSA seal.
- Discovering the origins of the 12 documents in the Book of Confessions.
- Exploring concepts of biblical authority and interpretation and ethical decision making.
- Discussing major theological themes (including "TULIP" from Calvinism).
- Studying levels of church governance (including a review of BPC officers/ committees!).
- Skimming the contents included in the Book of Order that is updated every 2 years.
- Highlighting the importance of worship, mission, and Christian education.

I will also share here an excerpt from an article by Rev. Dr. Clifton Kirkpatrick, Professor (with whom I studied) at Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary and stated clerk emeritus of the PC(USA) General Assembly:

*Recovering Paul's countercultural teaching — the church as the body of Christ* 

"The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), at its best, has modeled its life and ministry on the biblical image of the body of Christ. The very first chapter of our *Book of Order* captures this ethos when it states, "God has put all things under the Lordship of Christ and has made Jesus Christ Head of the Church, which is his body." Everything about the church – its faith, polity, worship, and mission – seeks to be a faithful reflection of the body of Christ.

It is this understanding of the church as the body of Christ that has led the Reformed tradition and the PC(USA) to develop some of its core values:

*The lordship of Christ* – Everything that we do is centered on Jesus Christ, who is our Lord and Savior and the Head of the church.

*Honoring diversity* – As the body celebrates diversity; we celebrate, affirm, and welcome the rich diversity of all God's people in our common life.

*Shared leadership* – There can be no authoritarian leadership in a Presbyterian church because all parts of the body have gifts that must be honored. That is the basis of the Reformed conviction that the spiritual leaders (deacons, ruling elders, and pastors) are to be elected by the people of God.

*Being one church* – Just as there is only one body of Christ, there is only one church. Each of our congregations is an organic part of the broader denomination, and the PC(USA) is just one part of the universal church. To be Presbyterian is to be ecumenical!

A holistic ministry – Our mission in the world – our ministry – is the ministry of Christ. Just as Christ was called "to bring good news to the poor... to proclaim release to the captives and...to let the oppressed go free" (Luke 4:18), so are we.

*Discerning the mind of Christ* – The purpose of our governance, which on the surface has many parallels to US political institutions, is not to balance political interests in the church, but to enable elected spiritual leaders, together in prayer, dialogue, and reflection on God's Word, to best discern the mind of Christ. In many ways our culture is pulling our churches away from these values. In a time when there is a "consumer mentality" about religion, when individual mega-churches rise in popularity, and when "interest groups" seek to shape the church's life, this vision of the church as the body of Christ can seem very countercultural. That was also true for the New Testament church. However, that church, like our own, found that when the church centered itself on being the body of Christ, God richly blessed the church – and through the ministry of the church, the world. Let us live with confidence that the same will be true in our time!"

Finally, here are some questions asked by the attendees of Presbyterian 101:

- 1. How much autonomy does an individual congregation have? Our polity is connectional, which is in between congregational and epis-copal (having bishops) and congregational. The session is the main local decision-making body.
- 2. Who founded the Presbyterian denomination? During the Protestant Reformation in Europe, some Christians who agreed with Martin Luther in his criticisms of the Roman Catholic Church disagreed with him in other theological matters. Among those were Huldrych Zwingli, Heinrich Bullinger, and John Calvin (who became the most prominent). Among Reformed churches, a "presbyterian" form of church government arose, in which local congregations are governed by "elders," which is *presbuteros* in Greek, from which "presbyter" is derived.
- 3. What are some Presbyterian stereotypes? We are sometimes seen as the "frozen chosen," academic, wealthy, bogged down by committees, and letting everyone have their say in a fair but lengthy process.
- 4. Where do Presbyterians stand on "morality" issues? We are all over the spectrum, representing a vast variety of views, as we encourage people to think for themselves. Compared to the general population, the PC(USA) generally leans slightly more progressive on social and moral issues. As examples, articles were made available on denominational statements on abortion and reproductive choice and on sexuality and same-gender relationships.

#### Matthew 25: A PC(USA) Invitation



Matthew 25:31–46 calls all of us to actively engage in the world around us, so our faith comes alive and we wake up to new possibilities. Convicted by this passage, both the 2016 and 2018 General Assemblies exhorted the PC(USA) to act boldly and compassionately to serve people who are hungry, oppressed, imprisoned or poor. By accepting the Matthew 25 invitation, we can help our denomination become a more relevant presence in the world. We recognize Christ's urgent call to be a church of action, where God's love, justice and mercy shine forth and are contagious. And we rejoice how our re-energized faith can unite all Presbyterians for a common and holy purpose: our common identity to do mission.

To some degree, many churches are already doing the work of Matthew 25. We hope that by partnering with mid councils and congregations, we can together multiply and intensify our loving commitment to radical and fearless discipleship. When signing up, we will be asked to embrace one or more of the three areas of focus – building congregational vitality, dismantling structural racism, and eradicating systemic poverty. Then as we live out our commitment, we will be asked to share the story of impact that our pledge has made: how our congregation has changed, how we've discovered new passions and vitality, how our members have been re-energized as disciples ... so like in the early church, your renewed faith will fan the flames and encourage other congregations to also embrace our common mission. **Epiphany and Star Words** 

The season of Christmas began on December 25 and continues until Epiphany on January 6 (the 12 days of Christmas)! Epiphany is the celebration of God's self-revelation to the world in Jesus Christ. The symbolism of light is important: not only because of the star that guided the magi, but as it relates to the bright dawning of God's selfrevelation in Christ. The magi who traveled a great distance to find the Christ-child were responding to the gift first given to them through the guidance of the star. They received God's gift, then offered their gifts to God.

We will celebrate Epiphany on Sunday, January 5. During worship, we will each be invited to receive a Star Word. What is a Star Word? It is simply a star-shaped piece of brightly colored paper with a word on it. Every person who comes to church on Epiphany Sunday receives one and is asked to reflect on that word for the coming year. We are invited to ponder what significance this word might have in our lives, and how God might be speaking to us through that simple message.

The star words are passed around to the congregation using the same offering plates that we use later on in worship to gather up the tithes and offerings. As people help themselves to a star (without looking—just reach in and grab!), the significance is not lost. In this moment, people are not asked to give; they are invited to receive. It reminds us that this is always the order of things in God's realm – God always gives first, and then we are invited to respond with our gifts and ourselves.

Marcus J. Borg (1942–2015) was an American New Testament scholar, theologian and author, among the most widely known and influential voices in progressive Christianity and internationally known in both academic and church circles. Marcus brought clarity and insight to an understanding of Jesus and Christianity that was accessible and transformative. This video series contains favorite moments, core teachings and extensive never-before seen material from the archives plus commentary from Rev. Marianne Borg.

## **Highlights of December Session Meeting**

- Deacons met with Session and reviewed activities for the year their report will be included in the Annual Report.
- New Deacons (Tanya Best and Laura From) and Elders (Carole Enneking, Lori Schmidt, and Diane Winebar) met with Session and were approved for Installation.
- Elders and Deacons whose terms were concluding were thanked for their dedicated service – Tanya Best, Marilyn Edwards, Tom Edwards, Tom Hursey, and Cindy Gillen.
- Approved calling Annual Congregational Meeting/Corporation Meeting on Sunday, January 26 following worship. Minor revisions in current by-laws regarding quorum and monthly dates for certain Congregational Meetings will be presented for approval.

- Maumee Valley Presbytery met on . November 19 at Van Wert Presbyterian Church. Suggested honorarium for Pulpit Supply increased to \$140 per Sunday (plus mileage). Grace Administrative Commission reported that Grace Presbyterian Church (Toledo) was sold to Northwestern Missionary Baptist Church for \$180,000 which included paying realtor fees for the purchaser. Our attorney was also able to collect \$3,500 from the earnest money agreement we had with The Tabernacle (who cancelled prior purchase agreement). Maumee Valley Presbytery will receive approximately \$175,000 from the sale of the building. MVP has paid past unpaid bills, freeing the church of collection agency fees, a lien on the property, as well as monthly bills for utilities and insurance. Agreed to renew current lease agreement with Mt. Sinai for three years at rate of \$600 per month (\$500 from Mt. Sinai and \$100 from Norwalk Presbyterian Church). General Presbyter Matt Meinke's contract renewed for another year. Approved allowing Galion Presbyterian Church to sell their property and move to smaller space. Welcomed Rev. Kenneth Chorle at Market Street Presbyterian (Lima) and recognized retirement of Rev. Pamela Short from Tontogany Presbyterian Church. Installed Commissioned Ruling Elder Janeane Hopkins as Moderator and Rev. David Montgomery as Vice-Moderator for 2020.
- Per Capita Statement for 2020 is \$3,677.10 (103 members at \$35.70 each). Approved request from family to move Bill Marshall from the active membership roll to "other" roll.

• Carpet/pews/chairs in sanctuary were cleaned for \$585. Since there is no fire extinguisher at the manse, Pastor Karol was advised to personally purchase one which would then be her personal property.

- Approved accepting gift of framed Oscar Velasquez painting depicting our church building and yard during the Blaze of Lights from St. John's UCC.
- Confirmation Class, led by Pastor Karol and Tenna, is being offered in January if there is an interest.
- November Pastoral Care: 6 home/hospital/ nursing home visits and 9 cards sent. Maple Crest Communion Service (12 served) with Deacon Dave Van Eman and Sue Van Eman playing the piano. Home Communion visit (1 served) with Deacon Tanya Best. Congregational activities: Worship, Word in the World, Claralice Circle, Faith Formation Intern Supervision, choir, Personnel Reviews, Presbyterian 101 (twice), Graveside Service for Bob Braden in Port Clinton, Blaze of Lights Benefit Dinner, Adult First Aid/CPR/ AED Training Class, Youth Skit Rehearsal, and committee meetings. Presbytery activities: Maumee Valley Presbytery Meeting in Van Wert and Discipleship Team Meeting in Perrysburg. Community Engagement activities: Bluffton Area Ministerial Association Thanksgiving Service at Senior Center and Bluffton Area Ministerial Association Breakfast. Since a previously approved vacation day (November 27) was cancelled due to officiating at services for Bob Braden, approved request to take December 23 as substitution.
- Approved Bev Begg's request to utilize Bill Begg's memorial funds as follows: \$660 contribution to "Roll On" and \$440 contribution to Youth Missions. Approved Betsey Angus' request to use Bob Angus' memorial funds (\$254) to purchase new artificial Christmas tree and ornaments.
- "Roll On" balance as of December 8 was \$5,333 (includes November 30 balance \$3,909 - \$2,608 of contributions less disbursements to the From's, \$1,301 receipts from the Blaze dinner, \$189 from selling Blaze dinner leftovers and additional \$1,235 receipts of contributions from community members/ congregation).

### **BPC Treasurer Position**

Darin Leugers elected to resign as Treasurer effective December 31, 2019. The Stewardship & Finance Committee, Pastor Karol, and the congregation thank Darin for serving as Treasurer for the past five years and are grateful for his dedicated service to the church and assistance during this transition period. Thank you Darin! The Stewardship & Finance Committee will be handling the job functions until a new Treasurer has been installed and if you encounter any questions or issues during the interim period, please contact Clair Winebar or the church office.

#### 2020 Telling Our Story Giving Campaign and Budget

The Stewardship & Finance Committee and Pastor Karol extend a big and grateful thank you to our fellow members and friends for providing your prayerfully considered estimates of giving for the annual stewardship campaign. Thank you! Your response allowed Session to approve the 2020 general fund budget which will be provided as part of the January 26 congregation meeting.

### **Roll On Campaign Introduced to Help Tyler and Laura From**

#### (Highlights from the Minute for Mission)

Many of you know the Hursey family—Tom and Rebecca, their daughters Lisa and Laura, and Tom's mother Dorothy. Each member of the family has served our congregation in some way. In 2007, Laura became engaged to Tyler From. Tyler was attending UNOH in Lima when he was introduced to Laura through a mutual friend. They were married in our sanctuary in 2008 and shortly afterwards moved to Wyoming. Less than a year later, a freak accident left Tyler paralyzed.

For the last 10 years, Laura has cared full-time for Tyler. Her parents built an accessible room onto their home so Tyler and Laura could live with them. During the last year, it has become evident that the conversion van that they have been using was at the end of its useful life. Many in our church family worried each time the Froms left for medical appointments in Michigan or for a vacation. A few months ago, Tyler and Laura qualified for a loan to purchase a 2016 For Transit handicap van. For the first time, Tyler can look forward as they travel - but best of all, our church family no longer has to worry when they travel!

The *Roll On* Campaign invites each member to consider a one-time or repeating gift to help underwrite the monthly van payment. The church has committed to paying \$220 (1/2 of the payment) each month. Each gift will make it easier for Tyler and Laura to afford this necessary vehicle. The Campaign includes options of \$55 (1/4 payment), \$110 (1/2 payment), \$165 (3/4 payment), \$220 (full payment) or any amount that fits your budget.

Thank you for considering this campaign. As of October 1, four months of payments have already been pledged! In addition, the Mission Committee is planning a Blaze of Lights Benefit Dinner on November 30 with proceeds going to the Roll On Campaign.
