Pastor's Letter

As we begin the season of Lent, take time to reflect on these words that comprise the introduction to the Presbyterians Today 2020 Lenten Devotional, "Becoming a Beloved Community: A Matthew 25 journey to the cross," by Donna Frischknecht Jackson. For those who do not subscribe to Presbyterians Today, but would like to have a Lenten devotional, copies will be available in the sanctuary for you to take home.

The season of Lent has often been a time to give up a vice or an indulgence (did someone say chocolate?) or to take on a spiritual discipline such as fasting or meditation. What if this Lenten season, though, we looked beyond personal disciplines and committed to creating beloved communities in our own backyards – communities reflecting the inclusive and healing love that Jesus modeled as he made his way to the cross?

"Beloved Community" was first coined by 20th-century American philosopher Josiah Royce. However, it was the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. who popularized it, using "beloved community" often in speeches to illustrate God's kingdom as truly a kin-dom. King's beloved community was not a far-fetched utopia, though, but rather an attainable society based on justice for all and selfless love of one another. For King, a community became "beloved" when every person had their basic needs met.

In creating this devotional, I thought about the commitment many of our PC (USA) congregations are making to become Matthew 25 churches. By doing so, they are building beloved communities that are dismantling racism, eradicating poverty, and revitalizing ministries by serving others boldly. I wanted to capture the many ways Jesus' words in Matthew 25 are being lived out and, thus, creating beloved communities. This devotional itself is a reflection of a beloved community, featuring the voices of 19 men and women who are passionate in wanting to see God's reign among them; they belong to the Presbytery of the Pacific -where "Matthew 25 work has been going on for years," says the Rev. Heidi Worthen Gamble, mission catalyst.

As you journey with these writers, it is my prayer that a vision for how to become a beloved community where God has placed you dawns this Easter.

My star word is "Family." I shook my head with a sense of irony when I picked that word because I am getting a heavy dose of family interaction these days. The matriarch of my spouse's family has been having significant health challenges the past few months. Group texting seems to be the preferred method of communication by certain siblings. My spouse and I prefer vocal conversation for communicating anything more complicated than "On my way home now" or "At the store, need anything?" Indeed, when my own mother passed away without warning, the gathering of family to take care of the details was not a tension-free affair.

This past weekend, our teenager enjoyed a wonderful time out of town (without us) with some of my side of the family. On the ride home from the train station, I learned about individual interactions they had. These interactions teach each of us how to get to know another person and how to allow other people to get to know us. Interactions with family members help us define our values, our passions, and how we want to contribute to society. That's a gift! I'd rather have a family (texts and all) than not have one.

Every time I see my star word "Family" as I pass my refrigerator, I am reminded to treat each family member with love and compassion, even if our preferred communication methods are dissimilar.

Ash Wednesday

On Wednesday February 26, stop by in front of the church on your way to work or school and receive **Ashes to Go**. Pedestrians, as well as drivers and passengers of vehicles who pull over, will be invited to participate. We offer Ashes to Go because the reminders of need, humility, and healing shouldn't be confined to church buildings. We probably need them more in the midst of daily life! The ashes are to remind us throughout the day of our need for God, and of God's call to us. There is much more to the beginning of Lent than ashes alone, and we still encourage making time for worship with a community of faith, for support from others and from the great traditions of faith in our work of repentance and renewal.

Then in the evening, join us for a **traditional Ash Wednesday service** at 7:00 PM at Emmanuel United Church of Christ (8375 Phillips Road). This service of worship will include the sacrament of communion and the imposition of ashes. Members of Emmanuel UCC and St. John's UCC will be invited to join us when we host a Maundy Thursday worship service on April 9.

Season of Lent

The whole season of Lent is a period of 40 days, occurring this year February 26 through April 11. Sundays are not included in the count, as Sunday is a day of resurrection. Its name is derived from the Middle English "lente," which means "springtime." In the early church, Lent was a time for people who wanted to become members to study, pray, fast, and be examined, in order to join the church Easter morning. Later, the season developed into a time for all Christians to prepare themselves for Holy Week, through confession, repentance, and rededicating themselves to Christ.

Highlights of February Session Meeting

- Clerk submitted following reports online four to Maumee Valley Presbytery
 (Necrology, Church Information, 2020
 Mission Pledge, and 2020 Terms of Call),
 2019 General Assembly Statistical report, and two Clerk questionnaires for General
 Assembly. Approved Baptisms of Bowen and Cooper Hochstetler, sons of Jade and Tyler
 Hochstetler, on January 26 Pastor Karol met with parents prior. Mary Barnett passed away on January 17 Pastor Karol officiated at services on January 25.
- Working on creating BPC business cards for congregation to carry and distribute when out in the community. Creating several designs and will secure input from church family. Chris Hochstetler has volunteered to address/send postcards to new parents of babies born at Bluffton hospital, informing them that our Little Free Pantry carries general baby necessities for unexpected needs. New Beginnings team provided/served a pizza supper for clients of the Lima Rescue Mission on January 11.
- Souper Bowl of Caring was a success with over \$200 in donations (after expenses) given to the Bluffton Community Assistance Program. Confirmation Class (four girls) is going well each participant has a mentor from the congregation. First Mennonite Church will host Community Vacation Bible School Sunday-Thursday, June 7-11.
- January Pastoral Care: 7 home/hospital/ nursing home visits; 5 conversations 14 cards sent. Congregational activities: Worship, Faith Formation/Confirmation Class, Faith Formation Intern Supervision, served dinner at Lima Rescue Mission with New Beginnings, Youth Group/Faithline, Claralice Circle, Word in the World, met with Jade and Tyler Hochstetler regarding Baptism of Bowen and Cooper, funeral services for Mary Barnett, Leadership Retreat, Souper Bowl of Caring (youth prep and event), and committee meetings. Presbytery activities: Commissioned Ruling Elder Committee, New Pastors' Group, and Discipleship Team meeting. Community Engagement activities: Bluffton Chamber Breakfast and Cory-Rawson Girls' Basketball game. Ending regular meetings of Pastor Relations Committee which was very helpful for Pastor Karol's initial two years as pastor – thanks to Sarah Brauen, Don Carroll, Darlene Hey, George Stultz, and Diane Winebar for faithful service for two years. Pastor Karol continues to be open to any direct feedback from church family.
- Repairs at manse sanded bedroom door, fixed door latch, changed furnace filter, repaired shower floor in basement, fixed shower head in basement, closed crawl space opening in furnace room because cold/heat causing condensation on furnace, and fixed door sweep on French doors. Warped board on deck will be fixed in warmer weather and will be looking into fixing corners of foundation. Repaired toilet in men's restroom at church. Approved Tawa Tree to spray 5 trees/1 bush on church yard for bagworms – \$650. Approved First Klass Lawn Care to provide five lawn treatments at manse (\$322) and church (\$400). Approved hiring Wellmann Brothers to seal masonry at church for \$7,700 to come from Building Fund. Checking into painters for painting wood trim along edge of church roof. Connected with Drew concerning snow removal contract – at church (no minimum amount) cleans for \$50, ice melt \$35, manse driveway (3-inch minimum) \$25.

 support Bike Rack proposal with exact
 location yet to be determined.

Stewardship Strategies

Did you know that if you are 70 1/2 or over and have an IRA you can donate to the church or any other charity and reduce your income tax bill even if you take the standard deduction? The way to do this is to ask the custodian of your IRA to make out a check to the Bluffton Presbyterian Church for the amount you wish to donate. You should ask the custodian to put your name on the advice line so the church will know where the contribution comes from. You should make a copy of the check when you receive it so you can give it to your tax preparer who will then reduce your taxable income by that amount thereby reducing your taxes. If you have any questions please ask your tax preparer or a member of the Stewardship Committee.

Community Chili Cook off

Another successful Community Chili Cook off was held on February 18. With the help of eight area churches and ten chili cooks, the event raised \$1,380 for the Bluffton Food Pantry. Chili recipes were provided by Cathy Carroll (BPC), John Hochstetler (BPC), Missy Pilash (Bluffton Baptist), Jesse Owsley (Emmanuel UCC), Mike Edmiston (First Mennonite), Tom Downey (St. Mary's Catholic), Mennonite Home Communities, Julie Yoder, Zac Kohli and J.W. Shannon (Bluffton Community Assistance). Close to 180 people sampled the chili recipes while others purchased sandwiches and treats. The People's Choice Award was claimed by John Shannon, with John Hochstetler (2019 winner), and Jesse Owsley close behind. Several bins of donated canned and boxed food items were collected that night, as well.

Special thanks to Jodi Brauen for all her work organizing the kitchen, and Lynda Best and Carole Enneking for coordinating the event. Concession volunteers included Cindy Gillen, Dave Van Eman, Betsey Angus; Laura & Tyler From collected food donations; Molly McCracken and Owen Brauen handled the voting; Sue Van Eman organized the entertainment; Jayne McGarrity and Clair Winebar covered the payment table; Chris Hochstetler, Don Brauen, and Diane Winebar filled in where needed. Donations and additional volunteers were provided by English Lutheran, St. John's UCC, First Methodist churches, and others.

Students of Dancer's Elite (Debbie Garlock) and Krysti's Music Studio entertained the crowd. This event shows how well the Bluffton community works together to meet the needs of our neighbors.
