Pastor's Letter

"Observe the Sabbath day, to keep it holy. Work six days and do everything you need to do. But the seventh day is a Sabbath to God, your God. Don't do any work—not you, nor your son, nor your daughter, nor your servant, nor your maid, nor your animals, not even the foreign guest visiting in your town. For in six days God made Heaven, Earth, and sea, and everything in them; he rested on the seventh day. Therefore God blessed the Sabbath day; he set it apart as a holy day."

~ Exodus 20:8-11, the Message

There is a story where one man challenged another to an all-day wood chopping contest. The challenger worked very hard, stopping only for a brief lunch break. The other man had a leisurely lunch and took several breaks during the day. At the end of the day, the challenger was surprised and annoyed to find that the other fellow had chopped substantially more wood than he had.

"I don't get it," he said. "Every time I checked, you were taking a rest, yet you chopped more wood than I did." "But you didn't notice," said the winning woodsman, "that I was sharpening my ax when I sat down to rest."

There are so many times, in our rush to be useful, to have an impact, to be useful; we take on so many tasks that we become discharged. We are so drained that, even when we try to do good, we do good badly. That is because there is no rest when we put our hand to the task there is no quietness within our mind when we try to listen to another. As one ancient text puts it, do we have the patience to wait until the mud settles out of your water.

There are times in my life when I realize that it was a time for a break. Not because of the reoccurring illnesses (like my recent throat infections!). Not because of 60+ hour work weeks. Not when I "cook" more at Taco Bell than at home. I realize that it is time for a break because of what is now being called "phantom cell phone". It means that you think you hear your cell phone ring and then when you go to answer it, no one is there. And it's not just ringing cell phones,

but even cell phone vibrations! Can you imagine when we are so ready for the next call, text, or email that our imagination (or nerves) calls one into existence? Some recent studies are pointing to this as a very common experience of cell phone users.

It's a sign that we need to unplug for a while. Close the laptops. Turn off the cell phones. (gasp!) Don't check email.

But that is hard to do. Our culture pre-supposes that action and business is somehow better than rest. That doing something, anything, is better than doing nothing. Doing nothing has a very negative implication for Americans. Thomas Merton once noted that: "there is a pervasive form of contemporary violence [and that is] over activism and over work. The rush and the pressure of modern life are a form, perhaps the most common form, of its innate violence." It has become our standard greeting: "I'm so busy." As a culture, we are constantly striving for more: more work hours, more projects, and more signs of success. Is it any surprise then, when we feel exhausted and deprived in the midst of great abundance, longing for time with friends and family, longing for a moment to ourselves. A millennia ago, the tradition of Sabbath created an oasis of sacred time within a life of unceasing labor. But even today a time of rest is needed.

The modern hassle and hustle of life – we've lost the rhythm between work and rest. All life requires some rhythm of rest. There is a rhythm in waking and in sleeping - just as there is in day and in night. There is a rhythm in the seasons and cycles of life. Farmers know that you can over use a soil – and when you do nothing will grow there. Why do we forget these simple lessons? Even, as Wayne Muller makes note: "our heart knows that it needs to rest after each, life-giving beat - and the lungs rest after their work" - why do we try to push ourselves and others so far? Rest time is time off the wheel; time when we take our hand from the plow and allow the essential goodness of creation to nourish our souls. In rest, we are given a revolutionary tool for cultivating those necessary human qualities that grow only with time: wisdom, courage, honesty, generosity, healing, and love.

"Every now and then go away, have a little relaxation, for when you come back to your work your judgment will be surer, since to remain constantly at work will cause you to lose power of judgment... Go some distance away because then the work appears smaller, and more of it can be taken in at a glance, and lack of harmony or proportion is more readily seen." These are the words of Leonardo da Vinci, and he was certainly no slacker. He excelled as a painter, sculptor, poet, architect, engineer, city planner, scientist, inventor, anatomist, military genius, and philosopher.

So, let's be sure that we take time to unplug, as our God commanded us to (yes, rest is in the Ten Commandments) for our own well being. Let us find the right cycle of rest and work in our lives.

Highlights of April Session Meeting

- Information on the proposed basement renovation project was shared and discussed. Approved project will include removing existing carpeting/ linoleum, stripping wallpaper, painting walls, installing additional shelving in closets, installing commercial grade carpet/linoleum (matching CE wing), replacing existing lighting, and refurbishing kitchen countertops. Total cost is estimated at approximately \$9,000. Should be noted that approximately \$5,000 has been received as a gift designated for this purpose. Approved that the basement renovation project be funded by gifts designated for this purpose with the balance to come from the Building Fund.
- Mission Committee reported that Alternative Gifts campaign for 2012 received \$150.
 Preliminary total for One Great Hour of Sharing – is \$895.35. Making plans for participating in 2013 Mobile Health Fair by asking members to donate either complete dental/hygiene kits or donating loose items for them. Planning for lunch on Pentecost – May 19 and assembling kits afterwards. They will be taken to the MVP meeting on May 21.

- Approved request to move Communion from May 5 to May 12 because Pastor Matthew will be on vacation.
- Landscaping Englehardt proposed landscaping design for 30 bushes on the Cherry Street side of church. The total price of the proposal is \$3,500 and they are willing to donate 75%. Approved accepting the proposed landscaping design with the remaining balance of the project to come from a gift of \$921.50 designated for grounds improvement. Discussion was held concerning creating an exterior handicap ramp leading to basement. Still waiting to get plans/price back from a contractor.
- Approved the following guidelines being requested from Guide One - our insurance company. All volunteers must be involved with the organization for at least six months before they are allowed in any position involving contact with minors. No minor should be alone with only one adult on church premises or in any church sponsored activity. These items will be added to the Christian section of Education our Manual of Operations.
- Christian Education committee recommended having Alternative Devotions on Sunday evenings for those unable to attend morning worship service. Pastor Matthew will be leading the service using parts of the morning service. No choir/ organist will be needed – plan to have guitar accompaniment. Approved having Alternative Devotions on Sunday evenings at 5:00 PM beginning May 12 for a trial basis in May/June.
- Approved Lori Schmidt's request to borrow the portable large projection screen for April 8.
- Students from Ohio Northern University are conducting the 2012 Financial Audit.





Let's Fill Pastor Matthew's Van

Fill it with what? Well, not surplus chocolate Easter bunnies or jelly beans (although I'm sure Pastor wouldn't object to that!) Plans are now underway for the 2013 Mobile Health Fairs in Maumee Valley Presbytery, which will be held this year from June 25 – July 3. As in the past, the Presbytery would like to have hygiene and/or dental kits to give to those coming to the Fairs, and the Mission Committee would like to challenge the congregation to fill the aforementioned van with kits that Pastor Matthew can take with him to the Presbytery meeting on May 21.

There are a couple ways to participate. If you would like to donate a preassembled hygiene kit, please bring a bag with a washcloth, soap, comb, shampoo, and possibly a nail brush. Dental kits would include a toothbrush and toothpaste. Please bring the bags to the church on or before Pentecost Sunday, May 19, and leave them in the designated boxes in the back of the sanctuary. (If anyone has any medium-sized to fairly large cardboard boxes they would like to donate, they would also be greatly appreciated!)

Loose items are also welcome. We will hold a "packaging" party on Pentecost, after the potluck lunch to be held that day (more on that to come next month), and then load everything into Pastor Matthew's van for the trip to Tecumseh, Michigan, where the Presbytery meeting will be held.

I'm sure I don't have to tell you this, but please be reminded that all items should be NEW, not "gently used"!!)

And as we also have done in the past two years, financial donations will be accepted and given to the Presbytery to be used for follow-up medical or dental care, if you don't care to donate a kit. Please designate "Mobile Health Fairs" in the memo line of your check, and make it payable to Bluffton Presbyterian Church.

It would be great to fill that van absolutely to the brim! Please join the Mission Committee in this outreach project.

College Graduate Katie McCracken



She is completing an internship this summer and will be enrolling in an MBA program in the fall.


Kory Matthew Enneking


program and he will travel with the group this June. In addition to the Ocean Focus program, Kory has completed Advanced
