"That Easter morn with joy was bright."

And what a bright Easter morn it was. From the men's breakfast, to Easter egg hunting, to a sanctuary filled with family and friends, to the choir's vigorous declaration, trumpet duo acclimations, and Jayne sharing "I know that my Redeemer liveth"; we celebrated Our Lord, Risen from Death. But the new life which is ours because of the resurrection is more than *a one morning thing.* We began earnest work on the "new life" 3 – 4 weeks before Easter and our work will continue across weeks to come. And that is just our worship consideration.

The resurrection changes our life – if we will claim it. Our life becomes something new. The resurrection does not call us to yesterday and the way things were – it sends us into God's future. It charges us with new responsibilities. It emboldens us with new blessings by God's Spirit.

Across these weeks we will cover "resurrection basics" – understandings which are necessary and we will move to "resurrection: advanced work" – which is new life applications. I hope you will join us as we do our "Easter work". It is more than a one morning thing!

The Gospel of Mark: In Mark's Words

Beginning May 11, the adult class will be starting a 5-week study of the Gospel of Mark, led by Pastor Dave. The class will be in a "seminar format", which is to say it will focus on **your** observations and reflections. It will be focused on the book of Mark, as a whole, rather than a study of specific verses. This format allows for each person's observation, because there is no expert answer. On the other hand, Mark is written in a very intentional style and certain questions become obvious when you read the book "as a whole". Come join us for a mystery, for investigation, and for inspiration.

Fair warning: because of the seminar format you **do** need to do the reading (homework). But be encouraged, the whole gospel is only 16 (or 22) pages. The Gospel of Mark: In Mark's words, starting May 11.

In the season of new life (resurrection):

a new beginning.

On Monday evening, the day after Easter, we gathered in the fellowship area and celebrated the church's love for us and our love for the church. It was a first step in a fresh consideration of life and mission for Bluffton Presbyterian. It was the first step in the New Beginnings program.

The next step will be when we receive the "Assessment" which will be the result of Pastor Henry Kim's work for us. The assessment is about 50 pages long and covers everything: how we spend our time, how we use our building, where we live, how strong (or weak) our building is. It also includes detailed information about our neighborhood, who our neighbors are, what they are looking for in religious experience, and what they care about with their time and money. The "Assessment" does not give any answers as to what our future will be, or what choices we should make. That is our business, our work.

As we journey through the summer and fall, we will use the "Assessment" as a springboard for prayer, thought, and decision as we consider God's future for Bluffton Presbyterian.

Begin now to lift up our life together and ask God about our future. It is God's future, but it will be your prayer and your choices.

Highlights of April Session Meeting

Update on Building Restoration Project –
When meeting with various contractors,
Wellmann Brothers (Coldwater) was highly
recommended several times for the
brick/masonry part of the project. Bid secured
from Wellmann Brothers (Coldwater) for
\$29,872 for brick/masonry work, sealing,
replacing necessary brick (estimate is 75
bricks with each additional brick being \$8),
caulking stained glass windows, copper roof
over handicap entrance.

M+R has determined that the present chimney cannot be taken down as three furnaces vent through it. Wellmann Brothers' bid for repairing/redoing the chimney making a chimney cap is \$11,488 (estimate is 100 bricks with each additional brick being \$8).

Approved hiring Wellmann Brothers from Coldwater to complete the brick/masonry/ chimney parts of the Building Restoration Project per previously mentioned bids at approximately \$41,500. Money is paid in installments – upfront, midway, and completion of project. While we don't know the costs for the remaining parts of the project, session felt the brick/masonry part needed to be done before any interior work could be repaired.

One bid for Duralast roofing (over Library/Office wing) has been secured from St. Henry. Patching would be up to \$5,000 with replacement costing \$11, 896. Tom Hursey will be meeting with a Findlay company that also uses Duralast to get a second bid.

Tom Hursey has met with at least two local contractors for the remainder of the project – doors, plaster, concrete, and painting – and is working to get bids from these contractors. Session is hopeful to have this information at May's meeting.

- Trees in the church yard were trimmed and one tree rubbing against the church was removed. M+R has fixed the drain in the sink in the women's restroom.
- Church has received \$264.84 from the village as reimbursement for electricity for the Blaze of Lights display. Church received \$750 from the estate of Jean Triplett – will be designated in the future. Approved having Clair Winebar audit the 2013 financial books.
- Secretary Cathy Carroll was given a card/gift card from the congregation in honor of Administrative Assistant's Day.

- Pastor Dave has continued to make home visits, weekly breakfasts, teach HS Sunday School class, Bluffton News article, participating in BAMA's Good Friday service, BAMA's devotion for the Bluffton News, Youth Group, preparations for New Beginnings visit, and serving on MVP's Reconciliation Team. Pastor Dave appreciates the work of the Deacons and being kept informed of needs.
- Approved extending the Bridge Contract for another three-month period and continuing with the rental agreement at the rate of \$663 per month. At the end of this additional time, information we receive from the New Beginnings report could then be included in an Interim Contract. Approved granting Pastor Dave study leave from April 28 -30 so that he might travel to Boston to be an assessor for New Beginnings. Approved granting vacation time for May 16-17 for Pastor Dave to travel to Washington, DC with his father-in-law on Honor Flight program.

BPC Treasurer Position

If you are a BPC member with bookkeeping skills and available time, we ask that you prayerfully consider applying for the Treasurer position.

The Treasurer is responsible for conducting the routine financial functions for the church. Primary functions include:

- Maintaining the financial records (books)
- Maintaining records and balances for Church funds (general, memorial, building, special events)
- Tracking of funds by budget line
- Tracking pledges and donations; preparing and distributing quarterly giving statements to members and friends
- Acknowledgement of memorial and special gifts
- Reconcilement of financial records to bank statements
- Payment of bills and payroll; ensuring disbursements are authorized
 - Payroll tax and reporting functions (withholding and tax returns and payments)
 - Handling medical, insurance, and pension reporting for Pastor
 - · Preparing monthly statements for Session
 - Preparing annual report for Congregation

The 2014 salary for the Treasurer position is \$4,906. The position typically requires four to six hours a week. Required skills include bookkeeping or accounting experience, diligence, basic computer skills (Excel spreadsheets, etc.), and good communication skills.

Session feels that we are better served by having a member serve as Treasurer, and would like for the Church to continue this practice if we are able to do so. If we must hire an outside accounting firm to handle the Church's finances, Session estimates that annual costs would most likely increase to roughly \$7,500. Using an outside accounting firm would represent a significantly higher level of expense for our Church. The Church's business function would also become a little less personable, and transactions and reporting would likely require longer lead-times.

Estate Planning

Few of us find it pleasant to contemplate our own demise. Yet as responsible stewards of the gifts God has entrusted to our care in this life, we should realize that the time will come when someone has to decide what happens to the assets we have accumulated over our lifetimes.

We all want to provide for our children and grandchildren. Most of us want to leave something more substantial than pleasant memories for the generations that follow us. One of the best gifts we can give to our survivors is a will, a plan detailing how we wish our affairs to be concluded. Survivors have enough to worry about: dealing with their grief, making or fulfilling the final arrangements. It is a loving act to provide survivors with a plan that we have carefully considered that removes from them responsibility for making decisions about the distribution of our accumulated goods. We strongly encourage anyone who does not have an estate plan to make an appointment with an attorney to create a will. That act can alleviate your own anxiety, as well as that of surviving children and other heirs.

Our denomination has designated May as "Wills Emphasis Month" to encourage congregations to emphasize to members the importance of making an estate plan. We further encourage members to consider making a charitable bequest to the church in that plan. Just as we encourage members to give a generous portion of their yearly income to the church's operating budget, so we hope our members make provisions in their estate plans for a generous gift to the church. So doing helps assure that future generations will have this church available to minister to their spiritual needs. Previous generations provided us with the church we enjoy through all life's seasons. It is only responsible stewardship to see that legacy continue.

We will observe Wills Emphasis Sunday on May 18. We will have some materials available that could help you get started making your own estate plan. It's never too early to get started.

Mobile Meals - Volunteer Drivers

Mobile Health Fair 2014

Plans are now underway for the 2014 Mobile Health Fairs in Maumee Valley Presbytery, which will be held this year from June 23 – July 1 to help migrant workers and others in need in Northwest Ohio. As in the past, the Presbytery would like to have hygiene and/or dental kits to give to those coming to the Fairs, and the Mission Committee would like to challenge the congregation to surpass our very successful collection of last year!

There are a couple ways to participate. If you would like to donate a preassembled hygiene kit, please bring a bag with a washcloth, soap, comb, shampoo, and possibly a nail brush. Dental kits would include a toothbrush (individually wrapped) and toothpaste. Optional items could include dental floss, chapstick, sunscreen (minimum SPF 15) or non-medicated eyedrops. Please bring the bags to the church on or before Sunday, May 18, and leave them in the designated boxes in the back of the sanctuary. (If anyone has any medium-sized to fairly large cardboard boxes they would like to donate, they would also be greatly appreciated!)

We will hold a "packaging" party on Sunday, May 18 after worship, for any volunteers who would like to help the Mission Committee assemble any loose items and put our church "sticker" on each bag. Presbytery would like to have the materials brought to the Presbytery meeting at Waterville, OH on May 20.

I'm sure I don't have to tell you this, but please be reminded that all items should be NEW, not "gently used"!! ;-)

And as we also have done in past years, financial donations will be accepted and given to the Presbytery to be used for follow-up medical or dental care, if you don't care to donate a kit. Please designate "Mobile Health Fairs" in the memo line of your check, and make it payable to Bluffton Presbyterian Church.

Vacation Bible School


