Pastor's Letter

It looked like a scene from a comedy. There Michelle is running down the moving sidewalk in the Milwaukee airport, and I'm there (a couple paces behind), trying to catch up. My bags are bumping against me and my wheeled carry-on falls over many, many times. We are going as fast as we can to go from gate C6 to A17 before our plane pushes off and leaves us stranded in a city.

Originally we were supposed to have over 90 minutes of layover at the airport. Plenty of time to make the change between "C" and "A" concourse, as well as leave some time for a quick dinner in the terminal. However, the last airplane developed some mechanical issues that delayed our flight over an hour. Some long taxiing and waiting for baggage left us with a mere 15 minutes to sprint (something I'm not good at) across three concourses. Needless to say, dinner did not happen that night.

All we knew is that we had to make that plane! Ariana was waiting for us at my parent's house! Michelle had to be in class the next morning! We were out of clean clothes! We had to make that plane! What would happen if we missed it?

Thankfully, we made it there in just the nick of time. We were, literally, the last two on the plane before they sealed the door. As we found our seats, I realized that there were some people seated around me who had been waiting to leave to get back to their homes, families, and lives. It's not fun feeling like the last one who has been holding everybody up.

This experience brought to mind the Parables of the Workers from Matthew 20. Let me share it:

"For the kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire laborers for his vineyard. After agreeing with the laborers for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the marketplace; and he said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right.' So they went. When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same. And

about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around; and he said to them, 'Why are you standing here idle all day?' They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard.'

When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, 'Call the laborers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first.' When those hired about five o'clock came, each of them received the usual daily wage.

Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received the usual daily wage. And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.'

But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?' So the last will be first, and the first will be last." ~ Matthew 20:1-16, NRSV

In my case of a late night run across an airport, I'm glad that the last worker received the same reward as the first worker. In this case, that "reward" was the ability to take a much needed flight. But the reality was, in the pilots waiting for me, they delayed the flight. And that wasn't fair at all to the other passengers. But it isn't about being fair – it's about being gracious.

We hear in this passage that the Kingdom of God isn't about being fair, but rather about being gracious. If the Landowner wants to be gracious to everyone, who is the laborer to complain?

Those of us who come first (either in airplanes or in Church) can sometimes feel that we deserve more. We are there, ready, and willing to go. Why should we wait for late comers? That is because the Landowner, our God is gracious to all.

Highlights of October Session Meeting

- Session met with Stephen Keizer (from Kalamazoo, Michigan) from the Presbyterian Foundation who shared information about running a capital campaign, as well as answer questions. Pastor Matthew met with Stephen prior to the session meeting.
- In an effort to control humidity in sanctuary, fans are to be kept running 24/7 with the vestibule doors being left open to help in air circulation. Motion made and approved to delay removing the curved, black top sidewalk in yard until next year. A plaque recognizing the tree given as a memorial for Ropp Triplett by Sunset Drive residents has been ordered paid for by Sunset Drive residents.
- Approved spending \$201.05 (for parts) to replace the "crash bar" on the rear door in the library. Session was asked for approval because this line item is now over the budgeted amount.
- Approved hiring Kori Phipps and Lynzee Lawler for Sunday morning child care services (8:45-11:30 AM) at \$9 per hour effective October 6. Current employer (Bluffton Child Development Center) provided background checks. Changing table has been attached to wall in the nursery.

Approved granting permission to Terry Mullenhour and Fred Steiner for the Blaze of Lights to use church facilities/alley on November 2, November 9, January 4 (set up/tear down) and November 30 for actual lighting ceremony.

- Pastor Matthew continues to look for someone to serve as our Presbytery Commissioner. Our new COM representative is Harry Tolhurst.
- Pastor Matthew had to cancel his Continuing Education for October 14 to be able to meet with Stephen Keizer from the Presbyterian Foundation. Approved granting permission to baptize William Culbertson, son of Greg and Lisa Culbertson, on Sunday, November 3.

Working on creating a new photo directory – photography being done by Samantha Rhonemus on Sundays following morning worship service. Secretary's computer was repaired/updated and online backup was added.

Approved granting vacation for October 23-30 (inclusive). Approved Continuing Education requests for – October 21 in Tiffin (Motivational Interviewing Course - \$185), October 22 – Non-medical assistance to those suffering from light/seasonal depression – telecast for \$50, and November 13 for Normal and Complicated Grief telecast for \$150.

 Elders discussed various proposals for the Building Restoration Project. Motion made and approved to recommend that the congregation proceed with project for approximately \$110,000 which would waterproof the church by removing chimney, replacing front doors, repairing/replacing exterior/interior water damaged areas, replace roof over office/library/nursery, tuck pointing where necessary, and sealing brick. Would like the work to be completed in 2014.

Decision made to run campaign by ourselves with information being shared via letter to congregation in November and offering tour of affected areas following worship services on November 24 and December 1. Approved calling a Congregational Meeting for Sunday, December 8, following the morning worship service for the purpose of reviewing the proposed Building Restoration project, presenting financial information, and voting on the Building Restoration Project.

Expect the proposed project to cost approximately \$110,000. Approved to run a two-year Capital Campaign from December 2013-December 2015 with up to \$30,000 to come from church resources (Savings, Memorial, Building Fund) and remaining amount \$80,000 to come from donations. Campaign would be handled by our Stewardship/Finance committee vs. hiring an outside consultant.

"More Than Enough" Our Season of Stewardship: Giving in Gratitude

"As I have listened to African American preaching, I have been impressed with how frequently I have heard the theme of gratitude that God has given this one day that we are alive," says Ed Taylor, who is himself the pastor of a Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) congregation.

"The heart of Christian faith is gratitude. The heart of Christian hope is gratitude. The heart of Christian love is gratitude. The heart of Christian life is gratitude. That gratitude is rooted in a sense that life is a gift, that life is good, that life is worth living."

"God's goodness is the reason to be generous. That conviction does not come from a Pollyanna view of life, from overlooking the difficulties or pretending they do not exist. That conviction comes from a sense that God gives us what is really important, what really matters, what we really need: the sense that life is worth living, that we are here for a purpose, that we are instruments of a loving God. What a difference that can make each day in how we live this life!"

"Some years ago a member of my family left the Christian faith for another great faith tradition, largely because she did not find, in her Christian experience, much joy in life. How unfaithful we are at times, causing some people to see us Christians as not appreciating and enjoying life."

"Our giving is a sign of our joy and gratitude. Our lack of giving is a sign of our lack of joy and gratitude. 'God loves a cheerful giver' (2 Cor. 9:7, NRSV). Eugene Peterson in The Message translates the sentence like this: 'God loves it when the giver delights in the giving."

Questions:

- Do we start each day with thanksgiving?
- Would that be hard to do?
- Does your faith bring joy to you?
- Do you delight in giving?

Prayer:

Generous God, whose giving is beyond our asking and imagining, give us such joy in our lives and in your creation that we may by our generosity bring joy to you and to others. Amen.

Special Offerings

The Mission Committee would like to report on our congregation's generous donations to the Presbyterian Church USA's special offerings gathered this summer and fall, as follows:

Bluffton Presbyterian Church garnered \$98 as its portion of the Pentecost special offering, taken up on Pentecost Sunday in May. The Mission Committee added another \$2 to round the amount to an even \$100, which was then given to the Bluffton Child Care Center (as the offering was dedicated this year to children's missions) for them to use as they saw fit.

The Peacemaking Offering was gathered on October 6, World Communion Sunday. BPC has so far received a total of \$338, and our portion of \$82.50 will be donated locally to the Lion and Lamb Peace Arts Center located on the Bluffton University campus. For those of you unfamiliar with the Center, it was founded in 1987 as a place for children to learn about "peace, justice, cultural understanding, and nonviolent responses to conflict" through literature and the arts, as an advocate for peace-learning and peace-living. Please remember that the final special offering of this year, the Christmas Joy offering, will be taken during Advent on December 15. The Presbyterian Church USA dedicates most of this offering to help the Church's clergy during their retirement years. Our own members Claralice and Carl Wolf receive assistance from the Christmas Joy offering. Please consider giving generously, in the spirit of the season, to the Christmas Joy offering.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance Appeals

The PDA has been responding to several recent natural disasters, both nationally and internationally:

- 1. A disaster declaration was made as massive rainfall and flooding recently affected most of the state of Colorado, which had also been suffering from wildfires over the past few years. PDA has been in contact with presbyteries in the area, and has offered assistance from One Great Hours of Sharing funds and the National Response Team. If you would like to help, you may designate funds to DR000015, specifying Colorado, either by check to Presbyterian Church USA, P.O. Box 642700, Pittsburgh, PA 15264-3700; by online giving at pcusa.org; or by texting to 20222 to donate \$10.
- 2. On October 13 Cyclone Phailin left a trail of destruction along parts of coastal India, the strongest to strike in nearly 15 years. At least 28 people were killed and nearly a million were left stranded due to the flooding. Fortunately, there was not a greater loss of life due to well-coordinated evacuations. PDA has made OGHS funds available for the distribution of food and other essentials to the cyclone centers. Again, if you would like to help, please designated funds to DR000091-India by check or online.


