61 Students Receive Synod Higher Education, COVID/Emergency Need Scholarships

The Synod of the Covenant is delighted to announce that it has awarded more than \$40,000 in scholarships to 61 students from 8 presbyteries and 18 churches. These awards, ranging from \$350 to \$1500, include winners of the Higher Education Scholarships and COVID/Emergency grants.


The Higher Education Scholarships include 39 bachelor degrees, 6 associate degrees, 1 vocational degree, 2 other degree, and 4 theology scholarships, while 9 students to date have been awarded COVID/Emergency grants.

Presbytery-Wide Book Study

This November/December, Rev. Cathi King and Rev. Dr. Matt Meinke will be leading a presbytery-wide book study on How to be an Antiracist by Dr. Ibram X. Kendi. Thursdays @ Noon via Zoom starting November 12. Register **now!** (You must register in advance to get the zoom link.) Praised by the New York Times as "the most courageous book to date on the problem of race in the Western mind," Kendi's groundbreaking work provides an essential counterpoint in the national conversation about race and resonates in this collective moment of reckoning. The term Kendi introduces—antiracist—sets forth the idea that people can either be racist or anti-racist, and that there is no inbetween. Racists, he argues, are people who support racist policies through their actions, inactions or ideas; anti-racists actively confront racial inequalities. Being neutral isn't enough. We hope you will join us for this important conversation, which will continue to shape our Matthew 25 identity, and continue the discussion seeking racial justice begun with our previous Robin DiAngelo book study. You may want to secure a copy now. It is listed on Amazon. Caution: there are several workbooks, summaries, and German translations of his book, so be careful as you order.



All Saints' Day: November 1

Saints' days began as a way to mark the anniversaries of the deaths of early Christian martyrs – their birthdays as saints through the completion of their baptism. By the middle of the church's first millennium, there were so many martyrs that it was hard to give them all their due. All Saints' Day was established as an opportunity to honor all the saints, known and unknown. In the Reformed tradition, the emphasis of this day is the ongoing sanctification of the *whole* people of God. While we may give thanks for the lives of particular luminaries of ages past, we also give glory to God for the ordinary, holy lives of believers in every age.

This is an appropriate time to give thanks for members of the community of faith who have died in the past year, and to pray that we may be counted among the company of the faithful in God's eternal realm. To rejoice with all the faithful of every generation expands our awareness of a great company of witnesses above and around (Hebrews 12:1). It lifts us out of a preoccupation with our own immediate situation and the discouragements of the present. In the knowledge that others have persevered, we are encouraged to endure against all odds. Reminded that God was with the faithful of the past, we are reassured that God is with us today, moving us and all creation toward God's end in time.

Reign of Christ / Christ the King: November 22

At the conclusion of the Christian year, the church gives thanks and praise for the sovereignty of Christ, who is Lord of all creation and is coming again in glory to reign (see Revelation 1:4-8). This festival was established in 1925 by decree of Pope Pius XI. Originally it took place on the last Sunday in October, just prior to All Saints' Day. Now it is celebrated on the last Sunday of the Christian year, a week before the season of Advent begins.

The festival of Christ the King (or Reign of Christ) ends our marking of Ordinary Time after the Day of Pentecost, and moves us to the threshold of Advent, the season of hope for Christ's coming again at the end of time. The day centers on the crucified and risen Christ, whom God exalted to rule over the whole universe. The celebration of the lordship of Christ thus looks back to Ascension, Easter, and Transfiguration, and points ahead to the appearing in glory of the King of kings and Lord of lords. Christ reigns supreme. Christ's truth judges falsehood. As the Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end, Christ is the center of the universe, the ruler of all history, the judge of all people. In Christ all things began, and in Christ all things will be fulfilled. In the end, Christ will triumph over the forces of evil.

As sovereign ruler, Christ calls us to a loyalty that transcends every earthly claim on the human heart. To Christ alone belongs the supreme allegiance in our lives. Christ calls us to stand with those who in every age confessed, "Jesus Christ is Lord!" Christ alone has the right to claim our highest loyalty. The blood of martyrs, past and present, witnesses to this truth.

Highlights of September Session Meeting



• Small groups have started up again. Adult Sunday School class began October 11 at 9:30 AM. They will be using a devotional titled "Unraveled". Families with young children have received a second packet of At-Home Faith Formation Activities to be used in conjunction with the "Growing in God's Love: A Story Bible". Youth Group had a field day full of wacky Olympic games/challenges followed with a discussion about what Jesus says about equality.

- Clerk participated in three MVP Leadership Zoom events - Dr. Allgood (Cincinnati Exec) advised for indoor worship during colder months to not run fans during worship, run heat prior to service but not during service, helping to prevent transmitting Covid airborne. Since we are unable to have funeral dinners in the basement, session did discuss possibility of offering "funeral dinners" by preparing food and taking to family home/gathering place for them to eat (not in church, not served by Deacons). With Synod's offices relocating from Maumee to Detroit they offered free office furnishings – five office chairs were picked up by Pastor Karol/Clair/Diane Winebar to replace office furniture donated in 80's. Approved donating the old office chairs/loveseat to ReStore. Approved that following people be moved to the "other" list as per their request - Cathy/Don Carroll, Jim Enneking, Steve/Tammie Mericle. Approval given to Laura From to borrow tables/chairs for October 10.
- Maumee Valley Presbytery met via Zoom on September 15 – 77 participated. Maumee Valley Presbytery presently has 5,469 church members – 530 less than previous year – demographics higher for older age ranges. Chip Hardwick, Synod Exec, shared that Synod is in process of moving office from Maumee to church in Detroit (savings of \$33,000 per year in rent). Church promises to use \$12,000 from rental income to support mission projects. Ellen Hugunin and Marie Louden Hanes enrolled as Inquirers. Kirkmont had 2 full weeks of camps – no Covid cases. Bowling Green earned most of incentive money for MVP campers (\$225 earned) and Ottawa earned (\$25). Rev. Katie Treadway elected Vice Moderator of MVP for 2021. Welcomed following people into MVP positions - Sara Hodsden (Huron), Lora Manon (Tontogany), Nancy Berkheiser (W. Unity), Bill Dunifon (Fairgreen), and Marie Louden-Hanes (Fostoria). Said goodbye to Hal Shafer (Van Wert) and Margaret Fox (Perrysburg). Approved Presbytery Per Capita increase of \$1.50 for 2021.

- September Pastoral Care: 5 visits; 28 calls; 16 cards sent. Congregational Activities: worship, weekly email with announcements/prayers, Facebook posts, Claralice Circle, Sister Min Circle, Faith Formation Intern supervision, Youth Group Field Day, sold tickets for Deacons Fundraiser, and church committee meetings. Community **Engagement Activities: Community Preschool** Board Meeting Zoom and BAMA Zoom. Presbytery Activities: Occasional check-in meetings with MVP General Presbyter and pastoral Leaders, MVP Stated Meeting Zoom, Commissioned Ruling Elder student liaison Zoom, Rekindle Youth Retreat planning Zoom, New Pastors' Group Zoom, Discipleship Commission Zoom, Boundary Training Planning and Boundary Training – co-facilitator for 8 in-person at FPC Maumee and 13 on Zoom. Approved following request that week of Continuing Ed. in June be changed to vacation (all vacation time would be used during 2020) and that one week of Continuing Ed. be rolled over to 2021 which is in accordance with MVP's policy.
- Vellenga Baby Gifts- \$145 donated to purchase Baby Monitor with camera, 3 books, and donation toward diaper fund. Received thank you email. Peace & Global Witness Offering - donations welcome through October. Louise Matthews, director of the Lion & Lamb Peace Center will participate in the October 25 worship service.
- Approved allowing village to use church lawn for Blaze of Lights display – plan to set up on November 7 with following week as back up if needed. Lynda Best will get insurance info from Village. Because of Covid we are not serving food in basement – plan to have table outside that day and have coffee, hot chocolate, cookies, fruit, snacks (all individually packaged) outside for workers.
- Dirt piles from planting new pine trees leveled out and grass seed planted. Manse yard still needs to be seeded. M+R replaced shower part at manse.

• Approved to spend up to \$26,100 to replace the existing church corner sign with a new electronic sign with funds to come from Electronic sign fund and Barnett bequest. Requested to be installed in spring of 2021 and will include a plaque noting that it is donated by the Stultz/Barnett families. Sarah and Ryan Brauen will be donating cost for the additional electrical work needed. Will cost approximately \$200 to remove sign and extra rider will be added to insurance (\$10 per year).

Worship Committee Report

At its October meeting, the worship committee made some adjustments regarding in-person worship services. We are returning to spoken Joys & Concerns. Prayer cards will still be available for those who wish to write out their requests. The cards may then be placed in the offering plate or given to an usher. Also, with the weather turning cooler, we will no longer be going outside for our closing hymn.

3 Cents A Meal Offering

Three Cents a Meal invites every member of our congregation to prayerfully contribute a few cents at each meal to help alleviate hunger and poverty. Ideally, contributions come from "living more simply so that others may simply live." Participation in Three Cents a Meal is also a commitment to share with others in response to Jesus' command, "You give them something to eat." Daily participation is a reminder of the reality of hunger for millions of our sisters and brothers in the world. As the money accumulates, those participating become aware that small, regular acts can result in significant responses to hunger and that there is great strength in working together with other Christians. We collect this offering on the first Sunday of each month. The funds collected are distributed to the Bluffton Community Assistance Food Pantry and the Presbyterian Hunger Program.

Community Assistance Program

The Community Assistance program has restarted their monthly food pantry hours. The congregation is invited to donate any of the following: cereals, chunky soups, canned fruits, canned meats (tuna, beef, pork, chicken), spaghettios, beans, spaghetti, sauces, macaroni and cheese, vegetables, hamburger helper of any kind, Mexican foods, salsas, creams, lotions, soaps, deodorants.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance

1st Thessalonians 5:17 encourages us to pray continually. Following a disaster, our best response is first to seek God's presence on behalf of those in need. Guidelines for Presbyterians in Times of Disagreement

In a spirit of trust and love, we promise we will...

Give t	hem a	beari	ıg
listen	before	we an	swer
(John 7:	51 and I	Proverbs	18:13)

 Treat each other respectfully so as to build trust, believing that we all desire to be faithful to Jesus the Christ;

- we will keep our conversations and communications open for candid and forthright exchange,
- we will not ask questions or make statements in a way that will intimidate or judge others.
- 2. Learn about various positions on the topic of disagreement.
- State what we think we heard and ask for clarification before responding, in an effort to be sure we understand each other.

Speak the truth in love (Ephesians 4:15)

- Share our concerns directly with individuals or groups with whom we have disagreements in a spirit of love and respect in keeping with Jesus' teachings.
- Focus on ideas and suggestions instead of questioning people's motives, intelligence or integrity;
 - we will not engage in name-calling or labeling of others prior to, during or following the discussion.
- Share our personal experiences about the subject of disagreement so that others may more fully understand our concerns.
- Indicate where we agree with those of other viewpoints as well as where we disagree.
- Seek to stay in community with each other though the discussion may be vigorous and full of tension;
 - we will be ready to forgive and be forgiven.

Follow these additional guidelines when we meet in decision-making bodies

- urge people of various points of view to speak and promise to listen to these positions seriously
- seek conclusions informed by our points of agreement;
- be sensitive to the feelings and concerns of those who do not agree with the majority and respect their rights of conscience;
- abide by the decision of the majority, and if we disagree with it and wish to change it, work for that change in ways that are consistent with these Guidelines.
- 10. Include our disagreement in our prayers, not praying for the triumph of our viewpoints, but seeking God's grace to listen attentively, to speak clearly and to remain open to the vision God holds for us all.
