Pastor's Letter

Your Special Day

"And God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it he rested from all his work." - Genesis 2:3

If I ask, "What has been the most special day in your life?" What pops to mind?

For me the answers ping-pong in my brain around a bunch of high-points: Michelle saying yes to marriage, Ariana being born, the day I was anointed and hooded with my doctorate, my first Sunday at my first church, or days of my childhood on family vacations. I'm sure that you have a similar list – times of family events, work accolades, personal achievements, and pivotal events. It's hard to choose. They are all important to me. It is hard – no *impossible* – to pick just *one* as the most *important*.

Our loving Creator understands that we need special days in our life. Not just one, but many scattered around and through our world. Our special days give us something to lean upon, embolden our reserve, and encourage us for the future. God understands this, so God established the idea early on of a reoccurring special day. God called this day "holy" which means that it was "set aside for a special purpose." The People called it Sabbath.

God wants us to have this special day regularly – not just waiting for our two weeks of vacation in the year. God wants us to have a regular blessed day that we can look forward to, relax on, and recharge in order to launch back out into the world. To have this as a regular day, not just a one-in-a-lifetime event, reminds us of God's perennial call back into a fuller life with Him and His will. Observing such days give us the chance to reconnect to life. Reconnect with God and with the important people in our lives. This is a time to do special things like: read to children and grandchildren, take a walk or drive in Creation, worship at Church or in small groups. It also gives us the time to disconnect from the busy, hurried, even frantic life we sometimes lead.

For some, this day of rest actually coincides with an observed day of worship (such as Sunday). But for many, it has to be a different day of the week. Sometimes it even needs to move to a different day each week because of the fluid nature of schedules! Whenever you and your family can observe it, remember what Christ taught: "The Sabbath was made for people, not people for the Sabbath." (Mark 2:27). That doesn't mean that we can ignore our day of rest, only that God is not going to quiz us on what day we take it.

No matter the day(s), it is a time to for us to say "God, please help me to do something different today. Help me find rest from my work. Restore my body, heart, mind, and soul. Please bless me this day in a way that will change all of my days."

Next Steps:

Please think about how often you and your family are able to observe a day of rest. Take an hour with the family and look at the calendar together. Plan when you can have a "holy day" that is, set aside for a special purpose day, each week. Put them on the calendar. Make a list of ideas that the family would like to do on these special days (e.g. family game nights, trips to the zoo, throwing water balloons at dad, whatever!).

Try to have at least four a month.

Understanding that emergencies come up – on these days, resist calls to go into the office, practices, and normal labor. And as part of your rest times, to receive support and fellowship, please try to make at least two times of worship with your sisters and brothers in Christ.

Highlights of September Session Meeting

- Update on Building Restoration Project Stewardship met after our August Session Meeting and they suggested waiting for better financial data. Elders were contacted via email, phone, or in person and the majority wished to uphold Stewardship's suggestion and place project "on hold". As of early September, Global Builders is now booked for the remainder of 2013. They provided other possible names, but none were available to do any work this fall. Global Builders did suggest replacing thermostats to be able to control the humidity in the sanctuary and this will be done. When possible, the outside doors will be opened to provide air circulation. Session approved inquiring about capital campaign drive for this project with managers from General Assembly. Pastor Matthew will make initial contacts and hope to have more information, perhaps a representative, at October's Session Meeting.
- Approved making the temporary placement of Jeanette Warren as Worship and Rhonda Moor as "at large" Elder permanent for the rest of their terms. Rhonda's term will expire at the end of 2014 and Jeanette's term at the end of 2015. Since Jeanette was not elected by the congregation, she will need to be approved by the congregation at the fall meeting when Elders/Deacons are elected.
- Approval was given to the Lions to use alley area with water as a rest station for a bicycle race.
- Approved to allow installation of a plaque near the tree which was donated in Memory of Ropp Triplett by friends on Sunset Drive.
 Neighborhood is covering cost for the plaque.
- Annual review of membership rolls was conducted by Pastor Matthew, Cathy Carroll (Treasurer at the time), and Lori. Approved moving Jenna Niswander to "other" list – done with family's permission.

- Darlene Hey will go to the next Presbytery Meeting, but has asked that we find a new commissioner.
- Approved Baptism of Ivan Edwards-Leeper, son of Laura and Todd Edwards-Leeper, on Sunday, September 22. Approved Baptism of Brennan Leugers, son of Amanda and Darin Leugers, on Sunday, October 13. Pastor Matthew has met with both couples. Approved to grant Continuing Education time to Pastor Matthew for Monday, October 14 so that he could attend a seminar called "What About the Building, God?" in Columbus.

Peacemaking Offering

We will begin collecting the Peacemaking Offering on October 6, World Communion Sunday. The General Assembly's adoption of Peacemaking: The Believers' Calling, which called for an emphasis on peacemaking, paved the way for this offering, which seeks to promote the Peace of Christ across the PC (USA). Individual congregations retain 25% of this offering and are encouraged to utilize this offering to sustain their local peacemaking ministries.

"More Than Enough" Our Season of Stewardship: Giving Freely and Joyfully

"Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." – 2 Corinthians 9:7

November is our Season of Stewardship. We start by giving thanks for those who have come before on All Saints Day and conclude with giving thanks to God for all our blessings on Thanksgiving Sunday. As we start to reflect on the call of Stewardship in our lives, let us focus for a while on the struggles of the early church.

Why do we give? In writing to the Corinthians, Paul is not above using competition in his appeal. In 2 Corinthians 8:1-5, he tells the Corinthians how generous the Macedonians have been, and in 2 Corinthians 9:2-4, he tells the Corinthians he has told the Macedonians how generous the Corinthians are. But he then tells them to give "not reluctantly or under compulsion."

Our age hates compulsion. We want freedom. We hate rules. We may have different rules today, but we do have rules we want to be free of. Paul was not fond of rules either. Many people think of him as one who burdened or complicated the simple faith of Jesus. But Paul worked to free believers from the rules he grew up with: circumcision and kosher dietary regulations.

Paul invites his Corinthian Christian friends to willingly, joyfully do the right thing, to be the kind of people God dreams that they are. We give joyfully to those we love and care about – our children, our parents, our close friends. Is God in this category for us?

Fred Craddock and Eugene Boring write that Paul was "not interested in himself as a successful fund-raiser but in helping the Corinthians to be the kind of Christians who gave of their own free will" (People's New Testament Commentary, Westminster John Knox, 2004, p. 566).

In the end, giving to the church is not about a budget, but about what kind of people we are.

Questions

What sort of things do we do under compulsion?
Do we like to do those things?
What do we do freely?
Does this include anything we do for others?
Do we like to do those things?

Prayer

O God who freely chose to love us and show that love to us in Jesus, free our hearts from burdens of compulsion that keep us from freely loving you, so that we may with all our hearts love and serve you, and freely give in ways that bring joy to your heart. Amen.

In addition to pet visits, earlier in the summer a group of singers entertained residents with show tunes and favorite hymns. One resident who had sung in barber shop ensembles even joined our members in the serenade. On another occasion, the Tuesday evening small group brought the original Trivial Pursuit game and engaged residents in a spirited competition of trivial memory. Most recently, volunteers and members of the Mission Committee have brought movies complete with drinks and popcorn for residents' enjoyment.

Despite the best efforts of a caring staff, life in a facility such as Richland Manor suffers from a day-to-day sameness that can sap residents' spirits. The Mission Committee has challenged our members to participate in this caring ministry in response to the demands of our faith to show hospitality to the stranger, care for and visit the infirmed, and share God's love wherever we see a need. We plan to offer a diversion, a respite from the normal routine of life for Richland Manor residents at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, October 5 by showing the movie "Sister Act" accompanied by popcorn and drinks. We'll be doing it again on November 2 and December 7 and we invite so-inclined volunteers to help brighten the day for some deserving, special people.
