Harvest (and planting, and choices)

I am a city boy. So the progression of the seasons still amazes me. (Because it was hidden from my sight across those years.) As the seasons of the fields move, we are now in the season of harvest. Across the last 6 weeks we have moved from the fields being green with life – to them now being dull brown with life stored in the grain and bean. The harvesters are now moving into action.

And with the harvest comes questions. Was it a good harvest? Is there plenty or not? What shall be done with the harvest?

The choir has been singing the following setting of Luke 12. It begins with the rich fool, extolling his wonderful harvest and proclaiming, "I have filled my barns. What shall I do now? I'll build bigger barns. Fill them and then take my rest. I'll eat drink and be merry." But God says, "You fool. This night your soul is required of you; and where will all your riches be?"

The story reduces the whole process of farming to a question with a single point "where will your riches be?" But consider for a minute the way in which farming embodies all the questions of stewardship, and helps us to see the way that stewardship is not just a single question in a single season.

The farmer chooses which fields to plant and which to lie fallow, how much seed to use, how much time to allow for growth, yes, and what to do with the harvest. During this whole process the farmer has to exercise self-control – and not worry – even though many things are outside of their control.

Our stewardship is like this. It is not (just) about money, and it is not just a question decided once for a year. We make decisions about all our gifts and abilities, about all our time and activity. What are faithful directions for these choices? What gifts and abilities do we develop? What do we leave fallow? What former choices do we tend?

Which former choices may now be allowed to rest?

And through all the choices we make there is the purpose – which drives the choices – which is in the background.

Luke is clear about which purposes matter: the purpose of aiding the poor and suffering. For Luke this is the central thrust of God's purpose: love of neighbor.

We are in a season of stewardship focus, not just in the questions of our support of the church, but also in the sense of being clear about how our church meets and serves our community. Stewardship is fundamentally about what future we pursue. Where will we invest our resources? To what end? To what purpose?

We are like farmers – planting, tending, choosing, harvesting. But we are stewards. Neither the gifts nor the fruit are actually "ours". We are but stewards. What is it that God wants of us? What choices does God want from us?

An article about stewardship does not end with me telling you what to do. Stewardship is about God's questions for you. Your choices. Your gifts and how you use them. These questions are ongoing and continual. May you answer them wisely, for Christ's sake.

Bread for the World Sunday, October 19

Our congregation will observe Hunger Awareness Sunday on October 19 as part of a nationwide observance of Bread for the World Sunday. Bread for the World is an organization of Christian congregations and individuals who work to increase awareness of hunger issues in America and around the world. The organization focuses on working to support and improve the U.S. government's nutrition and food assistance programs.

World hunger has seen a dramatic reduction over the past 25 years – more than 200 million people have been removed from the hunger statistics. Nevertheless, 805 million people are still hungry. Malnutrition causes nearly half – about 45% – of the deaths of children under the age of five. One in four of the world's children are stunted. In some countries and in the poorer regions of others, the proportion rises to one in three or even higher. Stunted children do not reach their full physical or intellectual potential. Across the developing world, 66 million primary school children attend classes hungry.

In America, 14.5 percent of U.S. households struggle to put enough food on the table. More than 48 million Americans – including 15.9 million children –live in these households. More than one child in five in the U.S. is at risk of hunger.

These international and domestic food insecurity statistics emphasize the importance of government food assistance programs. Bread for the World is an effective advocacy program that seeks to convince lawmakers of how essential continuing and expanding these programs is even in the face of budgetary restrictions. Highlights of Sept. Session Meeting

- Approved to repair the organ (controller board died) with estimate being \$2,424.95.
 Permission was granted to Hancock Horizontal Hundred Bike group to use alley area as a rest area for their recent event.
- On a recent rain the church basement carpet was saturated with rain. Schnipke, our general contractor, will be contacted to see if the new drain was a source of the problem. Session agreed to have the water removed professionally as the carpet was new and we wanted a professional bill if further investigation determined there was a problem with the new drain. Estimates for fill dirt options (for leveling yard and filling in where sidewalk was removed) were discussed. Anticipating the Blaze of Lights to be using the church yard again this year, Session was concerned if there was enough time to have the yard seeded prior to displays going up in early November. Schnipke will be consulted to see if we should reseed now or wait until spring. Church has received a letter from the village concerning parts of the sidewalk on Cherry Street not meeting requirements. The concrete company who did our sidewalks will be asked to evaluate the area and then a decision will be made on how to proceed. A section of gutter on the manse is sagging because nails have come out and will be fixed.

- Next summer will be our church's turn to host the Community Vacation Bible School. It was decided that even though we have less classroom area than before, we will be creative and make it work.
- Discussed installing a PowerPoint multimedia system (three LCD 55" screens – two in front, one in rear, and the computer to drive them) in the sanctuary. Pastor would be responsible for set up/running and system would be used throughout the worship service. Suggested to utilize on a trial basis for one year; system is being made available to the church at no cost. A sample will be set up for October's session meeting for elders to see and then ask for final approval.
- Pastor Dave's activities in the last month included: leading worship, visiting members, weekly breakfasts, committee meetings including New Beginnings, newspaper devotion, attending Bluffton University Church fair with Lin Rumer, and planning concert on the corner for September 20.
