Pastor's Letter

How do you feel on your first day?

First days at school are interesting times. They are not all good. And, they are not all bad. They really aren't in the middle either. First days are a swirling mix of good and bad; excitement and apprehension; elation and fright. And it doesn't seem to matter much how old you are either. These feelings come to every age. Whether you have kids still at home or long since grown, I'm sure that you can remember a time when you've had to take your kid to school for the first time. Maybe you remember your first time. There are a bunch of first days: everywhere from that first day of kindergarten, to the first day of high school, all the way to the dreaded first day of college (or maybe even grad school) where you have to leave your child, not for the day, but for a month or more! In every instance there is the miasma of feelings about what the first day is going to be like. Questions about making friends, liking teachers / professors, finding rooms, and taking care of themselves all fly around in student and parent's minds alike (and sometimes even grandparents).

And these feeling are not found only in the first day of school, but many other first days that we all experience. Remember the first day of being married? If that is not a time of a wonderful combination of emotions, I'm not sure what is. How about the first day at a new job? Or even the feeling when you've just bought a new house or car and you're trying to convince yourself that you've done the right thing. Clearly, there are many, many first days in our lives.

Perhaps we can feel for Joshua then, when we look at the first chapter of the book of the same name. The book opens with the death of Moses. Moses had been the People's great prophet who lead them out of Egypt and to the very boarder of the promised land. Moses who stood up to pharaoh and his armies. Moses who brought the Ten Commandments and taught the people how to worship. Moses who actually spoke to God! Now, can you imagine trying to follow an act like that? But that is what poor Joshua has to do.

Up to this point, it appears that Joshua has been Moses' aide. Throughout the Books of Exodus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy, we can hear of Joshua taking care of and instruction from Moses. Sometimes he is great at his job, and sometimes he is hiding in a tent. Yet, through it all, I believe we can hear a real heart of ministry in Joshua. But he has not been front and center — until now!

Have you ever felt like that? Times of your life when you walk in the room and feel that everyone's eyes are upon you, waiting for what you might say or do next? It's a tense time. Hear then the comfort that comes from God to this young leader, pushed beyond his comfort zone:

"Be strong and very courageous. Be careful to obey all the law my servant Moses gave you; do not turn from it to the right or to the left, that you may be successful wherever you go. Keep this Book of the Law always on your lips; meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do everything written in it. Then you will be prosperous and successful. Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the LORD your God will be with you wherever you go." (Joshua 1:7-9)

Basically God is reaffirming Joshua's call. God is encouraging him by saying. "Remember, as you walk with me, so too do I walk with you." Who can ask for stronger words of support than that? Knowing that God is walking with you, caring for you, watching out for you can be an incredible comfort as well as encouragement in your first day (and the day's beyond). It's little surprise than that after receiving God's words, Joshua is able to launch into his job. He starts to work with the people to accomplish Moses' dream and God's will.

In our first days, God is speaking to us also. Let us remember from the Word that God loves us as God's own children (1 John 3:1). As such, we can stand with Joshua when we hear "Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the LORD your God will be with you wherever you go." Truly, we are never alone. Wherever you are looking at a new doorway or path in your life, I pray that you hear the support of our loving God today.

Highlights of August Session Meeting

- Stephen Eslich from Global Builders guided Session on an exterior/interior tour of the church to show numerous areas of water damage, as well as the sources for the damage. To waterproof the church he suggested tuck pointing brick/stone, sealing masonry, removing chimney and capping, sealing around large stain glass windows, repairing areas damaged by water (interior/exterior), replacing half of rubber roof above CE unit, and replacing the three front doors. Session will need to decide how to proceed on the "Building Restoration Project".
- CE plans to offer Alternative Devotions for fall on a trial basis would meet first Sunday of each month from 5:00 to 7:00 PM to include meal and Communion. Youth Group would also coordinate with this date/time. Approved serving Communion during Alternative Devotions on the first Sunday of each month. Approved hiring two people to cover nursery on Sunday mornings from 9:00 to 11:30 AM at \$10 per hour subject to background checks. Money in CE budget would cover the remainder of this year, but additional money would need to be included in next year's budget.

 Approval was given to Sycks to use tent and Edwards to use tables/chairs.

Sunday School Kickoff

Sunday school will begin on Sunday,
September 8. We will meet from 9:00 - 10:00 AM
each morning. This year, we are inviting all ages
to study "The Story", an abridged chronicle of the
Bible. Each group, children through adults, will
be studying the same lessons each Sunday in age
appropriate ways. The hope is that studying the
Bible as one ongoing story will enrich everyone's
appreciation of its wonder. By studying it as a
church family we want to encourage further
growth in knowledge and understanding through
discussions outside the classroom, such as coffee
hours and family dinners.

To further encourage the idea of the connection between the different age groups, we will be starting each Sunday as one large group, meeting in the Sanctuary for a brief opening and snack before separating into our classes. Please make plans to join us for this special church-wide Sunday School Program. This is THE story! This is OUR story! We need to KNOW and LOVE it, so that we can SHARE it with others!



Mission Series I

The Mission Committee would like to present a series of discussions to Bluffton Presbyterian Church's congregation on just what "mission" is, why we do it, and how we can foster a "mission mindset" among ourselves to more effectively and creatively venture forth into the world to do God's work. This is the first of this series, and we will be offering other topics in the newsletter and elsewhere in the coming months that will hopefully spark meaningful discussions and actions on our part.

What happens when a disaster strikes somewhere in our area, our state, our country, or in the world? How do we as caring human beings, as Presbyterians and Christians, respond? How can we "witness to the healing love of Christ" in the face of hurricanes, tornados, floods, and tidal waves, fires, explosions, or other acts of war or terrorism that cause human suffering?

The responses to these types of situations form a large part of mission and in the Presbyterian Church, they are answered in large part by Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, our agency tasked with disaster response and the creation of refugee programs. The mission of PDA is "to care for families and communities impacted by disasters, and to help them achieve long-term physical, psychological and spiritual recovery as a witness to the healing love of Christ". It commits itself to equip Presbyterians worldwide to "effectively and efficiently serve disaster survivors in Christ's name so that out of the chaos of disaster they will find hope". The instant gift of \$1 million to Haiti in the wake of the devastating earthquake two years ago and the dispatch of a "Rapid Response Team" to Tucson, Arizona, after the shootings at a political rally there last year are two examples that come immediately to mind.

A little bit more about PDA: It is funded entirely through One Great Hour of Sharing, one of the four special offerings PCUSA collects annually (this one on Easter Sunday), and through individually designated gifts. It receives no federal funding. The PDA works nationally through PCUSA's local presbyteries and synods. A specialized volunteer disaster team provides consultation and assistance at these regional offices to design and implement local responses. It is a member of the ACT (Action by Churches Together) alliance, and NOVAD (National Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster); adheres to the International Red Cross Code of Conduct; and does not discriminate based on ethnicity, religion or political opinion and does not promote any of those as well.

Internationally, PDA works through local partners including Presbyterian and Reformed partner churches, ecumenical partners, and other faithbased or non-governmental organizations. It responds to approximately 20 U.S. and 30 international disasters annually. In another program, PDA cooperates with World Church Services to resettle refugees in the U.S.

What does all this mean to our congregation in a small Midwest town in Ohio? If we want to, how can we become involved in PDA ministries? PDA tells its churches that we can "stand in the GAP" to help disaster survivors.

G = Give. Support the OGHS offering; give by text on your cell phone to 20222, each text providing \$10 to support disaster response where it's needed most; designate a gift. To help you in this endeavor we have placed special PDA offering envelopes in the front and back of the sanctuary and posted them on the "Mission Bulletin Board" in the back of the church. Provide material aid, such as Gifts of the Heart kits (more on these at a later date).

A = Act. Stay informed. Sign up to receive PDA Rapid Information Network (RIN) emails to be aware of current PDA responses and urgent needs. Volunteer for work teams or assemble Gift of the Heart kits. Information about all of these can be found on PCUSA's website under "mission".

And most of all, P = Pray. As 1 Thessalonians tells us, we should pray without ceasing. Pray for the people whose lives are directly affected by a disaster. Pray for the first responders and relief workers. And pray for hope to be found amidst the chaos of disaster. Your prayers are requested above all else.

On another note, please remember that on October 6, World Communion Day, we will be taking up a special Peacemaking Offering. Twenty-five percent of the money we collect is designated to our congregation to use for our local peacemaking and mission outreach. Please mark your calendars and give as generously as you are called.

That way, everyone will have the chance for worship, devotion, and dinner, but still home before too late on a school night. The theme for our first meal is Simple Foods. So for our meal, each family is asked to bring one dish that costs no more than \$2 total! That's it, only \$2.00 – no more. Bluffton University senior, Tamara Al-Sammarraie, will join us for worship on Sunday, September 22. The Iraqui Student Project (ISP) is a non-profit organization that supports the needs (medical expenses, etc.) of university students from Iraq. If you feel inspired to help ISP or Tamara, you can make a taxdeductible cash or check donation on Sunday, September 22, or at any time throughout the academic year. Nursery Worker

The Christian Education Committee will be interviewing candidates for the position of nursery worker. Session has approved this to be a paid position and the hope is to find an adult from the community with child care training and experience. A detailed application and interview process is being developed. The successful candidate will have child care experience and training, including first aid and safety training. We will also require background screenings to be completed prior to beginning work. We also felt that the candidate should demonstrate a strong and growing faith.

There are multiple benefits to hiring a person for this position:

Create consistency:

- Being greeted by the same friendly person each week will hopefully make leaving Mommy and Daddy a little easier for the youngest members of our church family.
- Having a person trained in child care will create a safe, nurturing, and positive experience for the children each time they are in the nursery.
- We want to hire someone who has a strong faith, that will share this with the children in appropriate ways through games, stories, crafts, and play. Hopefully, this will make the children's time in our nursery a joyful start to their faith journey.
- Our child protection policies and procedures will be implemented consistently.
- Lighten the burden to families and volunteers:
 - This would allow more members of our church family to participate in worship consistently.
 - This would eliminate the need to constantly request volunteers, thereby allowing members to offer their time and talents to other areas of need.

Until this position is filled we will continue to rely on volunteers to staff the nursery. If you are willing to help, please sign up in the back of the sanctuary. If you have questions or concerns regarding the nursery worker position or interview process, please see Pastor Matthew or a member of the CE committee.

Triennium – One person's perspective

First, I would like to thank the entire congregation for all of the support they gave me and the youth attending this year's Triennium. It was a wonderful experience! I will do my best to give you an idea of what PYT 2013 was like, but as the youth will attest, it is very hard to put the Triennium experience into words.

This year over 5,000 Presbyterian youth gathered at Purdue University to gain a new understanding and appreciation of the I AM. Through worship with 5,000+ people, games, and activities involving 100s of participants, small groups of 25-30 strangers, evening discussions with 6-7 floor mates, and individual reflection and prayer; each delegate explored their relationship with God. We were encouraged to listen closely for God's call in our lives and to answer that call with enthusiasm, knowing we are connected to the I AM in a very special way.

Each worship and small group discussion was built around the "I Am" statements that Christ used to illustrate His purpose on earth, His love for us, the redemption He brings, and His everlasting presence in our lives. Through different worship leaders, music, drama, craft, and electronic media projects, we were shown over and over how we are connected to God and each other. We even watched a documentary from Tom Shadyac, director of "Bruce Almighty", "Evan Almighty", and "Ace Ventura: Pet Detective", titled "I Am". The movie sought the answers to two big questions: "What's wrong with the world?" and "How do we fix it?". The answer: nothing is wrong with the world, we just tend to forget how connected we are to everyone and everything in it. (Sorry if I spoiled the ending for anyone.)

For me the idea of being connected was very powerful and very comforting. We are connected to an all powerful, ever present God! The love that is extended to us is unending and the redemption that we receive is unconditional. God has called us to be His children and through His grace we receive forgiveness, strength, and comfort. We are also connected to each other and if we are receiving all of these wonderful things from our God, how can we not share them with one another.

The "I Am" statement that I felt illustrated this idea of being connected particularly well came from John 15: 1-12: "I am the vine, you are the branches". The worship leader reminded us that for a branch to grow it must have a healthy vine supporting it. Jesus Christ declared Himself our vine, we have THE PERFECT support system. If we truly rely on Him, we will grow in ways we could never anticipate! But, it doesn't end with the branch. Each branch produces many leaves, beautiful flowers, and delicious fruit by passing on the goodness that comes from the vine. We are the branches! We must share Jesus Christ, Our God, with others.

We each have been given special and different gifts to help us share the Good News of Jesus Christ and God expects us to use them. But remember, we are connected to the I AM and we will never be alone in this task. We are also connected to each other and by combining our gifts and efforts we can become even more than is possible alone. Is a single grape as satisfying as a vineyard, each branch heavy with delicious grapes? Is a single flower as beautiful as a garden full of colorful blooms? It is our connections to God and each other that make us all that we were designed to be.

This is what I brought home from Triennium. Each of the youth will be sharing their experiences at Triennium as part of the opening to Sunday school in October. I hope you will join us to hear their thoughts on those Sundays, or seek them out and talk one-on-one.
